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Naples, Sept. 24.

Otwithstanding all the care our Viceroy takes to suppress the Banditi, their numb rener as s, so that this Kingdom is greatly infested with them. Two Companies of Foot, newly raised at Otranto, are come hisher, which with others are designed for the State of Milan.

We are at prefent very Warsaw, Septemb. 25 quiet in thete parts, and according to all appearance are like to continue io. It was indeed the general discour e for several months past, that this Crown was going to enter into a War in Conjunction with the Violcovites against the Turks, and there was then ground enough for it considering the Negotiations that were on foot for the making a League Offensive and D fensive between this Crown and the Czar of Mo civy; but at prefent the Dispositions feem very much altered, and are become very averfe to the War, occasioned by a belief that the Moscovites would not be fincere in it, but that they would mak their own Advantages at our Expence, as well as by the backwardnels of the Princes (our King send his Ambassadors to) to give their Assestance for the carrying on if the War.

Genoua. O Tob. 9. The third In ant arrived here the Palestine, captain Salmon, the Exchange Captain Mar in, from Scandaroone, the Unity, Captain Kecher and the Lucituala, Captain Warner from Zant, and the . . . C ptain Groves, from Naples.

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Mad id, Odob. 4. The Bankers here have been agreed with to remit 500000 Crowns to Flanders, of which 100000 are to be paid to the Prince of Parma before the end of December, and the rest in the four following Months. The Calleons will part from Cadiz the la ter end of this Month, or the middle of the next at farthest. The Count d'Estrees continuing in the West Indies, does somewhat disturb this Court, not knowing what his defign may be. Since the latter end of August we have had here such abundance of Rain, accompanied with Thunder, Lightning, and violent Storms of Wind, that it is not to be expressed, and particularly this day sevennight it rained so violently for three or sour hours, that the Water rundown the Streets as a River, and did much harm, several persons being drowned, and a House of Pleasure, belonging to the Countess of Ognate, being in a manner swept away by the violence of the Currant. From Gallicia they write of some differences they had with the Portuguese.

Stockholme, Olob. 9. The States of this Kingdom are to meet here the 11th Inflant, after which the Queen will make her publick Entry into this place. We hear no more of the Alliance which was aid to be Treating between this Crown and France. Mr. Warwick, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of England, is arrived here.

Lintz, OI. 14. The 9th Instant the Commission oners appointed for the Trial of the Count of Zinzendorf, late Prefident of the Chamber of the Rewenues, met at the House of Count Nostitz, and there pronounced the Sentence they had concluded against the sai Cou t Zinzendorf, which was, That for fev ral Misdemeanors, Breach of Trust, and evil Administration, he should pay to the Emperor 197000 Gilders, That he be de irived of all publick employments, and that he retire to some place, fuch as the Emperor shall assign, and live privately there. The Emperor purpoles to remain here this Winter, but the Empress Dowag r and the Queen of Poland will part the 22 In ant for Vienna. The Princ of Baden, who was fent by the Emperor to the Electors and other Princes of the Empire, to confer with them concerning the present Stite of affairs, is returned, and has made his Report to his Imperial Majesty. We are told that a considerable Sum of money is sent to Hungary for the Payment of the Imperial Troops, which for want of it begin to be somewhat disorderly.

Ratichonne. Off. 14. The Duke of Wurtemberg has, by a Memorial, acquaint d the States affembled here, That he has been Summoned by the Parliament of Befanzon to do Homage to the French King, for his Principality of Mompelgart, and that in default thereof he is threatned with Military ex cution, and therefore defires that the Empe or and the Dyet will take care to protect him, or else that they will not take it amis if he be forced, to prevent the Ruine of his Countrey, to Comply with what the French require of him. We do not yet hear that the Dyet has taken any resolution in a matter of this

importance-Polldam, Off. 9. The Prince of Orange arrived here yellerday: The Elector went out with a great Train of Coaches a Le gue from this place to meet his Highness, and wolk dalittle way on foot to receive him; after which they both went into the Electors Caleche, the Prin e having the Hand. The Regiment of H reeGuards marched to a Town called Brandenburg, seven Leagues from hence, to meet his Highnes, and attend him hither, where the Guards du Corps of Horse and Foot were drawn up to receive There are come with his Highness two Comtes of Nassaw, the Comte de Solmes, Monsieur Overkerke, Monsicur Benting, and Monsicur Ginkell, Sin to the Heer d'Amerongen, who is Envoy from the States in this Court, with feveral Officers of the Army. How long his Highness intends to stay, is not yet known, but on the rith Instant he will be entertained by the Electores at a Countrey-House which she has a League from this place, down the River, called Capor; and the next day it's faid, his Highres intends to go to Berlin to visit the Electoral Princes, who continues there since her being brought to bed. This day all the publick his nifters have made their Compliments to his Highnels, upon his arrival here.
