The dutiful and loyal Address of the Grand Jury, Gentlemen, Clergy, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of the County of Brecon, affembled in their Shire-Hall, at Brecon, this first Day of April One thousand eight hundred and three.

Most Gracious Sovereign,
WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects,
the Grand Jury, Gentlemen, Clergy, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of your County of Brecon, with grateful Hearts for the many Bleffings which we, in common with our Fellow Subjects of the United Kingdom have so long enjoyed under your Majesty's paternal Government, presume humbly to approach the Throne.

Permit us, Sire, in the unadorned Language of Sincerity and Truth, to express our firm Attachment to your Royal Person and Family, and to the excellent Constitution established in these Realms.

Accept our warmest Congratulations upon the providential Discovery of that malignant and atrocious Conspiracy which has dared to raise its bloody Arm against your sacred Life, and threatened to deprive the Nation of its best and dearest Support.

Long may the Divine Providence continue to your People the Bleffings of so good a Government, and so good a King; and may the House of Hanover never fail to supply a just and worthy Successor to fill that Throne which we now see so happily filled by your Majefty.
