We acknowlege with the most unseigned Gratitude, the signal In terposition of Divine Providence under which the Conspirators were timely arrested, and their Treafons most happily frustrated. And we fincerely hope that the Punishment so justly inslicted on the Traitors may secure our beloved Monarch from future Danger, and preferve to your Subjects the inestimable Bleslings of our happy Constitution.

Deeply sensible of our Happiness under your Majesty's mild and auspicious Reign, and viewing with Abhorrence the Attempts of Domestic Traitors against your facred Person, and with Indignation the infidious Machinations of foreign Powers against your Majelty's Dominions; we chearfully offer cur Lives and Fortunes in Support and Defence of our revered King and Constitution against the malignant Essorts of Domestic or foreign Enemies.
