We reflect with Astonishment upon the miserable Contrivers of this hateful Project, equally contemptible as it is atrocious; for (aimed at a Life justiyendeared to all except themselves and their infamous and most hardened Afforiates, and against a Form of Government the most excellent in the World) nothing but a Stupidity darkening and confusing. hy a most providential Consequence, the Minds of Men which admit the Entertainment of shameful and cruel Deligns of Treafons, could have induced them for a Moment to expect its Success, or even to escape Detection before the dreadful Hour of its Explosion: Such a Disposition, however wonderful, having been shewn to exist, must be watched and

guarded against in every Quarter of your Majesty's Dominions. And we affure your Majesty that we will oppose to all Enemies of the State, both foreign and domestic, the most energetic Resistance in our Power.

We are thankful, that, by the laudable Vigilance of your Majesty's Administration, this meditated Scene of Riot, Murder, and Plunder has been prevented; and we earnestly hope that the universal Prayer addressed to the Throne of Grace for a long Continuance of your Majesty's Life may be granted to an affectionate and loyal People.
