We trust that the same Protection which has been afforded in this Instance to your Majesty, and to our Country, will be graciously dispensed by the Ruler of the Universe, if ever a like Attempt shall be made for the Destruction of our best and dearest Interests; and that, in spite of all our Enemies, you will long live to enjoy the Gratification of seeing your Empire prosperous, and your People in general loyal and happy.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, and Town-Council of the ancient Borough of Haddington, beg Leave humbly to approach your Royal Presence, with the most heartfelt Congratulations upon the late providential Escape from the imminent Danger which so lately threatened your Royal Person from the desperate Attempts of Traitors.

Feeling as we do in common with your Majesty's other Subjects the distinguished and peculiar Privileges we enjoy as a Nation and as Individuals, it was with the utmost Indignation that we viewed the late atrocious Conspiracy, which aimed at nothing less than to deprive us of these Blessings, which aimed a Blow at the Life of a Sovereign so justly dear to us all, and, in fine, which threatened to reduce us from the highest State of political Happiness to the opposite Extreme of Anarchy, Confusion, and Distress.

With these Sentiments impressed upon our Hearts, we feel it our bounden Duty to offer to your Majesty this our unfeigned Tribute of loyal Congratulation; and we feel grateful to those Ministers by whose Vigilance and Activity so daring an Enterprise was crushed before it reached Maturity.

Finally, we trust that the late awful Warning, (which the Fate of the wretched and misguided Men who took a Part in that Conspiracy afforded,) may have the salutary Effect of teaching the lower Orders the dreadful Consequences of such Violations of the Law; and that their truest Interest

consists in supporting a Constitution and Government which so completely protects them in the Enjoyment of their civil and religious Privileges.
