The Prebendaries, after like Reverences, placed themfelves on Bcuches on each Side of the Altar within the Rails.

The Sub Dean, with like Reverences, went also, within the Rails.

The Officers of Arms made like Reverences in the Middle of the Choir, and flood near the Foot of the Frince's Stall.

The Band of Mufic now began to play.

The Knights Elect, and Knights Companions, made their like Reverences fingly, or in Pairs, according to the Order observed in the Procession, and natived under their respective Banners, the Knights Companions being covered.

The Register and Secretary, and the Gentleman Usher, made their double Reverences, and flood Sefore their Bench at the Foot of the Sovereign's Stall.

Deputy Garter, the Genezlogist and Deputy Bath made their Reverences, and stood before their . Bench.

The Dean did the fame and went to his Seat in an enclofed Box near the Sovereign's Stall.

His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York, as Great Marter, having made his Reverences, and ftood under his Bancer covered, when the Anthem began.

The Doors of the Chapel were then clofed, and the Yeomen remained on the Outfide.

The Anthem being ended, Deputy Bath King of Arms made his double Reverences in the Middle of the Choir, and then bowed to His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York, who thereupon made his double Reverences under his Banner, afcended into his Stall, repeated his Reverences and fat down covered.

Deputy Bath then bowed to Lord De Blaquiere, who thereupon made his double Reverences, afcended into his Stall, repeated his Reverences and fat down covered.

Deputy Bath then bowed to the Earl of Malmefbury, who took his Stall in like manner.

Deputy Bath then bowed to Sir William Fawcett, who took his Stall in like Manner (his Companion Vifcount Galway, remained under his Banner to affit Sir George Yonge, the other junior Knight prefent, to offer the Banners of the deceafed Knights).

The Knights Elect also remained under their Eanners.

Then the two Provincial Kings of Arms, making the ufual Reverences, repaired to Deputy Bath, who taking up the Banner of the late Earl Beaulieu, Senior, deceafed, Knight, and bowing to Vifcount Galway, and Sir George Yonge, they came forward, made their double Reverence, received the Banner from Deputy Bath, and being accompanied by the two Provincial Kings of Arms, carried it with the Point to the Altar, where, with one Reverence, they delivered it to the Prebendaries, and then, with double Reverences, returned to Deputy Bath: The Organ, and other Infruments, accompanying this Part of the Ceremony with the Dead March in the Oratorio of Saul.

The Banners of all the other decealed Knights, viz. Lord Dover, Sir George Pocock, Lord Amher't, Lord Howard de Walden, Sir George Warren, Earl of Bellamont, Sir John Lindfay, Sir Charles Hotham, Sir William Hamilton, Sir Robert Murray Keith, Sir George Howard, Sir William Gordon, Sir John Irvine, Sir Henry Clinton, Sir Edward Hughes, The Marquis of Antrim, Lord Rodney, Lord Heathfield, Sir Robert Boyd, Sir Frederick Haldimand, and Sir Archibald Campbell, were offered in like Manner by the faid two Junior Knights, attended by two Heralds, the Mufic accompanying throughout: which ended, the Knights afcended into their Stalls, making the ufual Reverences, and fat down covered.

Then Deputy Bath bowed to Lord Henley and Sir William Augustus Pitt, the two fenior Knights Elect, who thereupon made their Reverences, afcended into their Stails and flood therein with the Hats and Feathers in their Hands.

In like Manner all the other Knights Elect and Proxies afcended into their Stalls.

Then Deputy Bath, carrying the Book of the Statutes and the great Collar of the Order on a crimfon Velvet Cultion, having on his left Hand the Gentleman Ufher, and being followed by the Dean proceeded to the Middle of the Choir, where they made their Reverences together.

His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York, as Great Mafter, then made his Reverences in his Stail, and defcending made his Reverences in the Choir, and being followed by the Dean, proceeded to the Stall of Lord Henley, where, receiving the Book of the Statutes from Deputy Bath, His Royal Highnefs prefented it to the Knight, and the Dean adminiftered the Oath. Then the Collar being delivered to His Royal Highnefs, he invefted the Knight therewith, put the Hat and Feathers on his Head, and placed him in his Seat, the Knight thereupon rifing up, and making his Reverences, His Royal Highnefs gave him the Accolade, and then returned with Deputy Bath, the Uther and the Dean to the Middle of the Choir, the Knight fitting down covered.

dle of the Choir, the Knight fitting down covered. All the other Knights and the Proxies having been inftalled in like Manner, (except that the Proxies were not invefted with the Collar, nor covered) His Royal Highnefs returned to his Stall, where making his Reverences, he fat down covered.

The Officers then returned to their Seats, and the Sanctus being fung, the Dean was conducted to the Altar by the Gentleman Usher. During Divine Service the Knights put their Hats and Feathers on the Cushions before them.

Upon the Sentence of the Offertory, "Let your Light fo fhine, &c." being read, Deputy Bath proceeded to the Middle of the Choir, and made his double Reverences; then bowing to Sir David Dundas, and Sir John Francis Cradock, they put on their Hats and Feathers, and making their double Reverences together, defcended into the Middle of the Choir, repeated their Reverences, and withdrew under their Banners.

In like Manner all the Knights, and the Proxies, were fummonded, defcended from their Stails, and flood under their Banners, and Deputy Bath returned to his Bench.

The two Provincial Kings of Arms then making their Reverences, waited on His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York, who, going from under his Banner, made a Reverence towards the Altar, (but not to the Sovereign's Stall) and another Reverence at the Altar, where taking off his Hat and kneeling down, he made his Offering of Gold and Silver; then rifing up and putting on his Hat and Feathers, he returned, making his double Reverences as he paffed to his Stall, wherein he repeated the like Reverences, and
