Crisis, to renew our Sentiments of Fidelity and  
Allegiance to your Majesty's Person, Crown, and  
Government.

We are fully satisfied that the present just and  
necessary War is entered into to preserve the glo-  
rious Constitution of these Realms, and to repel the  
Designs of the Government of France, whose in-  
ordinate and insatiable Views of restless Ambition  
are manifestly directed to deprive us of our Liber-  
ties, and our Existence as a free and independent  
Nation.

May the Event of the War be glorious for this  
Country, and may your Majesty long live in the  
Hearts and Affections of a free, loyal, and united  
People is our most sincere and ardent Prayer.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,  
The humble Address of the Freeholders, Justices  
of the Peace, Commissioners of Supply, and  
Heritors of the County of Caithness, convened  
by Edict of the Lord Lieutenant of the County.

*May it please your Majesty,*  
**WE**, the Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, Com-  
missioners of Supply, and Heritors of the  
County of Caithness, approach the Throne with  
every Sentiment of Loyalty and Duty, to assure  
your Majesty, that we feel as Subjects and Britons,  
the Insults offered to the Crown, which has in-  
duced your Majesty to withdraw your Ambassador  
from the French Court.

We are fully sensible, that your Majesty has  
shewn, during a patient and long protracted Nego-  
ciation, the utmost Desire to preserve the Blessings  
of Peace.

We are confident that the unprovoked Aggression  
of the Government of France, and a Spirit mani-  
fested by it, inconsistent with the general Safety of  
the Liberties of Europe, has made necessary the  
energetic Determination of your Majesty's Councils;  
and we are ready to support, with our Lives and  
Fortunes, whatever Measures your Majesty shall  
deem expedient to adopt for the Support of the  
Dignity of the Crown and the Safety of your  
People.

**W**hereas Alexander Scott, late Purser of His Ma-  
jesty's Ship *Iris*, stands convicted in His Majesty's  
Court of King's Bench, at Westminster, upon an Infor-  
mation exhibited against him by His Majesty's Attorney  
General, for unlawfully conspiring with his Commanding  
Officer, (also convicted upon the said Information, and  
now in Custody,) to defraud His Majesty's Government,  
and in pursuance of such Conspiracy, sending to the  
Commissioners for Vidualling His Majesty's Navy,  
false and fraudulent Vouchers for Monies pretended to  
have been paid for the Purchase of Provisions, for the  
Use of the said Ship, at the Island of Shetland, in the  
Months of September and October 1800; and the said  
Alexander Scott hath absconded from Justice, and Pro-  
cesses of Outlawry hath been awarded against him.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby  
offer a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS  
to be paid by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy,  
to any Person or Persons who shall apprehend, or give  
such Information to their Lordships' Solicitor Mr.  
Bicknell, of Spring Garden Terrace, London, or to  
Mr. James Horne, Writer to the Signet, at Edinburgh,  
as shall be the Means of apprehending the said Alexander  
Scott.
