Twelfthly, That the first Captain to the Admiral, and Commander in Chief of Our Fleet, and aiso the first Captain to Our Flag Officer appointed, or hereaster to be appointed, to command a Fleet, or Squadron of Ten Ships of the Line of Battle or upwards, shall be deemed and taken to be a Flag Officer, and shall be entitled to a Part on Share of Prizes, as the Junior Flag Officer of such Fleet or Squadron.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Seventh Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign. GOD save the KING.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 22d of June 1803,

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Ma-

jesty's Order in Council of the Eleventh Day of May last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bat-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Eleventh Day of July next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majelty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for fome Time longer, His Majelty doth, therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months from the taid Eleventh Day of July next, presume to transport into any Farts out of this Kingdom any Pig-tron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Malts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet Copper, or other Naval Stores, or do ship or lade any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or Ship or lade any of the Articles above-mentioned on board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majelty " to reffrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and 66 more effectually to prevent the Exportation of " Salt Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when pro-"hibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:" But it is nevertheless His Majelly's Pleasure, that

War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats in the Service of His Majelty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Com-

fary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided, that upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles for the Purposes of Trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of fuch Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Otuwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners and specified in the Bund, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the-Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lard High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the neceffary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
