The Pensioners from the 1st and Coldstream Regiments of Foot Guards.

*On Monday July 18.*

The Pensioners from the 3d Regiment of Foot Guards; and those from the 1st to the 11th Regiments of Foot, inclusive.

*On Tuesday July 19.*

Those from the 12th to the 35th Regiments of Foot, inclusive.

*On Wednesday July 20.*

Those from the 36th to the 59th Regiments of Foot, inclusive.

*On Thursday July 21.*

Those from the 60th to the 89th Regiments of Foot, inclusive.

*On Friday July 22.*

Those from the 90th to the 135th Regiments of Foot, inclusive; also the Pensioners from the Queen's German Regiment, the African Corps, Loyal Irish, Lord Strathaven's, Majors Waller's, Elford's, and Fish's Corps; the Queen's Rangers, Fencible Corps, Royal Garrison Battalions, Cinque Port and Lancashire Volunteers, the Royal Hospital Corps, also the American and other Corps, with the Militia.

*On Saturday July 23.*

Those from the Independent Companies of Invalids, Reduced Regiments of Marines, and Lettermen.

*On Monday July 25.*

The Serjeants from the Foot Guards at Ninepence per Diem; the Serjeants, Corporals, and Private Men who received the increased Pension on Account of Blindness; as also the Serjeants disbanded from the late Independent Companies, who receive One Shilling per Day; with the Private Gentlemen who receive Annuities from the late 1st and 2d Troops of Horse Guards.

And that all Out Pensioners (as well Lettermen as others) belonging to the said Hospital, who live at a greater Distance than Twenty-five Miles from London, and those in Scotland and Ireland, are hereby required and commanded, after the 25th of December next, and after every succeeding 25th of June and 25th of December, until further Orders, to apply to One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in the Neighbourhood where they reside, and make the following Affidavit, which the said Magistrate for the County, City, Borough, or Riding before whom the Pensioner appears, will sign and date, viz.

The Affidavit, drawn according to the above Form, dated and attested by a Magistrate, is to be

put up in a Cover, and sent by the General Post, directed thus, " To the Right Honorable the Paymaster-General, at the Horse Guards, London " And Counterparts, or Duplicates, of the said Affidavits, are to be reserved by the Out Pensioners respectively, to be exhibited to such Persons as shall be directed to pay them, that they may be satisfied that all such as may claim Out Pensions are the real Persons entitled to receive the same.

And to the End that the Commissioners for the Affairs of Chelsea Hospital may be satisfied that the Pensioners are the same Persons who have passed their Examination, it is hereby further directed, that such of them who have served in, and have been discharged from, any of the Regiments, or Independent Companies of Invalids, are not to mention in their Affidavits such Regiment or Company of Invalids in which they served last, but the Regiment, Troop, or Corps of the Army, from which they were first discharged, and recommended, and received at Chelsea Hospital.

And as the General Payments in Great Britain and Ireland, at the End of the ensuing Six Months, are generally regulated by the Places of Residence mentioned by the Pensioners, who are mustered at Chelsea in Person, and in the Body of the Affidavits of those who live at a Distance, it is hereby ordered and directed, that no Person who shall change the Place of his Abode given in at his Muster, or specified in his Affidavit aforesaid, and who may apply for his Pension (excepting to the Officers of Excise nearest such Place of Abode), shall receive the same, unless it appears by the Certificate of respectable Persons, that such Removal was through unavoidable Necessity, which he or they could not foresee or prevent.

It is also hereby notified, that none will be entered upon the Pay Lists of the said Hospital, or be entitled to receive any Benefit therefrom, who shall not act agreeably to these Orders and Directions.

And His Majesty has been pleased to command, on this Occasion, that all the Lettermen, Serjeants, Trumpeters, and Drummers, on the Out Pension of Chelsea, or Kilmainham Hospitals, residing within the above District, whether discharged from the Regular Cavalry or Infantry, or from the Militia, or Fencibles, (such Men as by the Hospital Books, are now more than Sixty Years of Age, or who have lost a Limb, or their Eye-sight, or are Cripples, or who received a Certificate of their total Unfitness for further Service, from any of the Officers employed at the General Examination of Out Pensioners, in the Month of December 1802, excepted,) do, at the Times of their Appearance, as above mentioned, put themselves under the Orders of the Officers, who have been appointed to take them in Charge, and to cause them to be examined, as to their Fitness for Duty, either in the Army of Reserve, or on such other Service, as His Majesty may think proper to employ them upon, for the Defence of the Realm.

His Majesty is graciously pleased to declare, that all the said Lettermen, Serjeants, Trumpeters, and Drummers shall be considered as entitled to the Pension for the Six Months commencing from Midsummer last, notwithstanding those found fit for Service will commence Pay according to the Ranks which they held when discharged, from the respective
