To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Inhabitants of the Borough of Devizes, in the County of Wilts.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Inhabitants of your ancient Borough of Devizes, beg leave to repeat those Sentiments of Fidelity and Allegiance which the admirable Constitution of these Kingdoms, and your Majesty's paternal Sollicitude for the Welfare of your Subjects have so justly demanded.

After the short Cessation procured to your People by the conciliating Endeavours of your Majesty's Ministers, we lament that the unrelenting Malice, and insatiable Ambition of our implacable Enemy, has so soon renewed the Miseries of War.

Whilst we contemplate with Indignation the unjust Aggressions and injurious Pretensions of a Power which, ever hostile to the British Name, has, under its present Ruler, affected to aim at no less than the Subjugation of all Europe, permit us to assure your Majesty of our fixed Determination, as far as in our Power, to support every Measure which the Firmness, Wisdom, and Vigour of your Majesty's Councils may resort to for the common Defence.

Feeling confident that every Class of your Majesty's Subjects are warmly animated by the same Sentiments, and that the whole Nation will be united as one Heart and one Arm in the Defence of your Majesty's Person and Government, and the Preservation of the Rights and Liberties of your People, we look forward without Fear to the Issue of the Contest in which we are unhappily engaged, trusting that the Almighty will disappoint the Ambition of our Enemy, and place the Splendor of your Majesty's Crown, and the Prosperity of these Islands beyond the Power of Aggression.

That your Majesty may reign long and happy over a free, loyal, and united People, is our most earnest Prayer.

Allow us, most gracious Sovereign, to express our Gratitude for the paternal Regard manifested in your Majesty's Endeavours to preserve to us the Blessings of Peace, upon Terms consistent with the Safety and Honor of these Realms.
