Guns overboard; being a remarkable fine Veffel, I shall direct her to be valued and purchased into the Service, which I hope will meet their Lordinips' Approbation.

An Act for granting to His Majesty the Sum of Twenty Thousand Pounds towards defraying the Expence of making an Inland Navigation from the Eastern to the Western Sea, by Inverness and Fort William, and for taking the necessary Steps to-

wards executing the fame.

An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled An Act to enable His Majesty more effectually to provide for the Defence and Security of the Realm during the prefent War, and for indemnifying Persons who may suffer in their Property by such Messures as may be necessary for that Purpose; and to enable His Majesty more essectually and speedily to exercise his ancient and undoubted Prerogative, in requiring the Military Service of his liege Subjects in case of Invasion of the Realm.

An Act for consolidating certain of the Provifions contained in any Act or Acts relating to the Duties under the Management of the Commis-fioners for the Affairs of Taxes, and for amending

An Act to render more effectual Two Acts made in this present Session of Parliament, for the more fpeedily completing the Militiz of Great Britain, and for raifing an additional Military Force for the

better Defence of the United Kingdom.

An Act for raising in the City of London a certain Number of Men as an Addition to the Military Force of Great Britain, for the better Defence and Security of the United Kingdom, and for the more vigorous Profecution of the War.

An Act for the more effectually providing for the Punishment of Offences in wilfully casting away, burning, or destroying Ships and Vessels, and for the more convenient Trial of Accessaries in Felonies; and for extending the Powers of an Act. made in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of King Henry the Eighth, as far as relates to Murders, to Accessaries to Murders, and to Man-

flaughters

An Act for effectuating certain Parts of an Act, passed in the Second and Third Years of the Reign of Her late Majelly Queen Anne, intituled An Act for the making more effectual Her Majelly's gracious Intentions for the Augmentation of the Maintenance of the poor Clergy, by enabling Her Majesty to grant in Perpetuity the Revenues of the First Fruits and Tenths; and also for enabling any other Persons to make Grants for the same Purpose, fo far as the same relate to Deeds and Wills made for granting and bequeathing Lands, Tenements, Hereditaments, Goods, and Chattels to the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, for the Purposes in the said A& mentioned, and for enlarging the Powers of the faid Governors.
