To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Trades of the Burgh of Perth, viz. Hammermen, Bakers, Glovers, Wrights, Tailors, Shoemakers, Fishers, and Weavers, incorporated by Royal Charter, think ourselves called upon in the present Situation of public Affairs, to approach your Majesty's Throne with united Assurances of our Attachment to your Person and Government, and Reverence for our happy and glorious Constitution.

Permit us to assure your Majesty, that we view with Indignation and Abhorrence the late Proceedings of the French Government. Sensible however we are, that from your Majesty's Vigilance, the Wisdom of Parliament, and the Harmony and Unanimity that now happily exists among all Ranks of your People, the ambitious and daring Designs of the Ruler of France will be frustrated.

Determined therefore to resist to the utmost of our Power, the Insolence of the Enemy, and that the Rights and Privileges of Britons struggled for and obtained by our Ancestors at the Price of their Blood may be continued to us, and transmitted to our Posterity; we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that in case of actual Invasion, or of the actual Appearance of the Enemy on the Coast, we will with Cheerfulness give our personal Service and Assistance in any Manner that may be thought advisable and most conducive to the public Service for Persons in our Situation.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgeffes, and Inhabitants of the Borough of Bridgwater, in the County of Somerset.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's faithful Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgeffes, and Inhabitants of the Borough of Bridgwater, animated with the warmest Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, beg Leave to tender to your Majesty our strongest Exertions in resisting the Invasion with which this Country is threatened.

We wish not to conceal, because we view without Dismay, the Danger that awaits us. We feel assured that a brave and united People were never yet conquered by an invading Enemy; and it is, therefore, with the sincerest Pleasure that we are enabled to congratulate your Majesty on the Spirit of Unanimity which prevails among all Ranks and Descriptions of your Majesty's Subjects. To that Spirit, under the Divine Protection, we look with confident Expectation for the Humiliation of our inve-

terate Enemy, and for the Safety and Protection of the British Empire.
