To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,
WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Freeholders, and Heritors of the County of Kincardine, beg Leave, humbly to approach the Throne at this important Crisis, to renew our Assurances of Loyalty and of Affection to your Majesty's Person, and to express, in the strongest Manner, our confident Reliance on the Wisdom and Firmness of your Majesty's Government.

We see with Regret and Indignation, that your Majesty's anxious and uniform Endeavours to preserve to your People the Blessings of Peace have been rendered ineffectual by the violent Spirit of Animosity and the inordinate Ambition of an inveterate Foe, whose declared Purpose is to invade, plunder, and subdue this United Kingdom, and to destroy its Existence as an independent State. We are, however, happy in being able to assure your Majesty of the unanimous Resolution of the Inhabitants of this County to unite, with their Fellow Subjects, in supporting with their Persons and Properties, those Measures, which the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils may adopt, to defeat the Attacks and chastise the Insolence of our Enemies.

Trusting to those Measures and to the Justice of our Cause, we shall enter, without Dismay, on the great Contest for every Thing we hold dear to us as Men and as Britons, in the fullest Confidence that this Nation, with the Divine Aid, will be enabled to confound the Designs of the Enemy, to secure to your Majesty and your Heirs the Independence of your Imperial Crown, and to transmit to our Posterity the Religion, Laws, and Liberty which we received as our Birthright, and which we at present enjoy in the fullest Manner under your Majesty's mild and truly paternal Government.

In this momentous Crisis we are equally impelled by Inclination and Duty, solemnly to pledge to your Majesty, our most strenuous and persevering Exertions, in support of every Measure, which the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils may adopt for the Protection of your Majesty's sacred Person and Government, and for the Defence of the British Empire, which has gloriously resisted the rude Attacks of the Spoiler, and still retains, unimpaired, its Religion, Liberty, and Laws, amidst the awful Wreck of the desolated States of Europe.
