In this Confidence therefore, and in the perfect Conviction that we have been forced into the Contest by an unprincipled Enemy, actuated by Views of boundlefs Ambition, to which he confiders this Nation as the only Bar, we will be bold to affure your Majefty that we are not degenerated from our Ancestors, and that your Majefty may safely rely on the Courage and zealous Assection of your Subjects.

All Europe can bear Testimony to the Moderation, Candour, and Consistency of your Majesty's Demands, and must attribute the Renewal of a deadly and destructive War to that mad System of Fanaticism, inordinate Ambition, and Spirit of Aggrandisement which has so long characterised the Government of France. We acknowledge with Gratitude the parental Anxiety and unremitting Solicitude manifested by your Majesty for the Desence, Prosperity, and Security of the United Kingdom against the Attack of a sanguinary and implacable Enemy whose Footsteps are marked with Blood and Massacre, who seems determined at all Hazards to pursue his hostile Designs against the Happiness and Sasety of your Majesty's Dominions, and even threatens to put an End to our Existence as a free and independent People.

Thus circumstanced, and attached to your Majesty by every Principle of Duty and Gratitude, sensible that our present Sasety and future Tranquillity depend upon our Courage and Firmness, trusting in that Divine Protection which has always hitherto been extended to us, we pledge curselves to unite with our Fellow-Subjects in support of your Majesty's Throne, in Desence of the Lives and Property of your Majesty's People, the Government, Constitution, Honour, and Independence of the British Empire; and, rather than witness the

Diffgrace and Downfal of our Country, to periff with our Religion, our Libertics, and our Laws.
