Relying on the Providence of God, and the Mea-fures which have prudently been taken by your Majefty to guard against all hostile Attacks, we truit that the Attempt, if made, would be defeated, and your Majesty receive an additional Proof of the Strength of your Dominions, and the Valour and Attachment of your faithful Subjects.

Engaged with a powerful and infidious Foe, who knows no Bounds to his Dominion, who tyrannizes over the Continent of Europe, and awaits the Sacrifice of this happy Island as the ultimate Project of his reftlefs Ambition. We behold with extreme Satisfaction the wife and prodent Measures adopted by your Majefty's Government, of ftrengthening the Naval and Military Force, establishing Classes of the People, and calling forth the Energy of the Many to support the Happiness and Independence of the Whole

Under fuch Regulations we cannot doubt but the affociated Spirit of the Country, should the daring Invader attempt to effectuate what he has had the Boldnefs to affert, will teach him and the Confederates of his Ruin, that whatever Succefs may have hitherto attended his usurping Hand, it is referved for Britain to chadile the Intolence of France, and we have only to look back to those Monuments of our ancient Glory, the invariable Defeats of an invading Foe to establish this important Faith.
