WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, Free Burgesses and other Inhabitants of your ancient Borough of Maldon, beg Leave to offer to your Majesty our unfeigned Expressions of Attachment, and to assure you at this important Moment, when the Kingdom is professedly threatened to be invaded by a faithless and inveterate Enemy, whose Progress in other Countries has been marked by Bloodshed, Devastation, and Despotism, that we are determined to stand forth as with one Heart and one Hand, to aid your Majesty to preserve those Blessings which we possess under your Constitutional Government, and which we are equally anxious, as your Majesty is, should be preserved entire to our latest Posterity.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Mayor, Magistrates, Aldermen, Common-Councilmen, Clergy, Merchants, and principal Inhabitants of the ancient Borough of Great Yarmouth, in the County of Norfolk, beg Leave to approach your Royal Person on an Occasion the most important, and at a Crisis the most intertelling, with every Sentiment of Duty, Loyalty, and Affection.

Engaged with a powerful and insidious Foe, who knows no Bounds to his Dominion, who tyrannizes over the Continent of Europe, and awaits the Sacrifice of this happy Island as the ultimate Project of his restless Ambition. We behold with extreme Satisfaction the wise and prudent Measures adopted by your Majesty's Government, of strengthening the Naval and Military Force, establishing Classes of the People, and calling forth the Energy of the Many to support the Happiness and Independence of the Whole.

Under such Regulations we cannot doubt but the associated Spirit of the Country, should the daring Invader attempt to effectuate what he has had the Boldness to assert, will teach him and the Confederates of his Ruin, that whatever Success may have hitherto attended his usurping Hand, it is reserved for Britain to chastise the Insolence of France, and we have only to look back to those Monuments of our ancient Glory, the invariable Defeats of an invading Foe to establish this important Faith.

We are at the same Time, Sir, conscious that to deserve Success is to insure it, and that we are

called upon to discharge the Duties of the most active Preparation with unabated Zeal, Fidelity, and Attention.

Impressed with these Sentiments, your Majesty may be assured that your faithful People of Yarmouth, ever distinguished for their Loyalty to their King, and Love for our excellent Constitution, will, with one Hand and Heart unite in every Measure to preserve inviolate the Security of the Country, the Safety and Happiness of your Majesty (whom God long preserve,) and your People.
