Your Majetty's prudent and vigorous Measures for the Defence and Security of that ancient and venerable Fabric, inspire us with Gratitude and Confidence, and bind us by every Exertion within our Power to ensure, under Divine Providence, their complete

By the KING. PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R. HEREAS under the present Circumstances. much Danger may arise to the public Tranquillity from Alien Enemies reforting to, and residing in Great Britain: And whereas by an Act passed in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign, intituled "An A& to repeal an A& passed in the last Session of Parlament for establishing Kegu-" lations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein; and for estabushing,
until Three Months after the Ratissication of a "Definitive Treaty of Peace, Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident
therein, in certain Cases," due Provision has been made for inflicting Penaltics on all fuch Aliens as shall disobey any Proclamation issued by Us, directing that fuch Alieus shall depart the United Kingdom: Now We, being defirous of carrying into Execution the Intent and Meaning of the said Act, and thereby providing for the general Safety of the Realm, do, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, order and direct, That all Aliens being Subjects of the French Republic, or of any Place belonging to, or under the Dominion of the Government of the French Republic, or of any country of Territory at War with Us, who shall have arrived in G set Britain since the First Day of October One thou and eight hundred and one, and on or before this Day the Thirty-first of August (other than such Aliens as are hereinaster excepted), shall depart Great Britain in Manner hereinaster mentioned; that is

And all fuch Aliens refiding in other Parts of Great Britain (except as hereinafter excepted) shall depart Great Britain on or before the Twentieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred and three

And We do further declare and make known, that every fuch Alien who shall knowingly and wilfully refuse or neglect to pay due Obedience to this Our Royal Proclamation, and shall be found in Great Britain contrary to such Proclamation, will be liable to be arrested and committed to the Common Gaol of the County or Place where he or she shall be so arrested, there to remain without Bail or Mainprize until he or she shall be taken in Charge, for the Purpose of being sent out of Great Britain; and if any such Alien sent out of Great Britain in pursuance of this Our Proclamation shall, without Licence for that Purpose by One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, return into any Part of the United Kingdom, fuch Alien being duly convicted thereof will be liable to be transported for Life according to the Provisions of the faid Act.

And in order the better to enable such Aliens to comply with this Our Proclamation and the faid Act, We have caused to be provided Ships and Vessels at Gravefend, for conveying fuch Aliens to some Port or Ports on the Continent of Europe: And all fuch Aliens as are desirous to avail themselves of this Accommodation are directed to repair to Gravesend on or besore the Fourteenth Day of September One thousand eight hundred and three: And all fuch Aliens repairing to Gravesend, and having obtained their Passports conformably to the said Act, by applying at the Alien Office in Crown Court, Westminster, shall be permitted to embark, and shall be conveyed on board the said Ships to be surprised by Us, free of Expence, to some Port on the Continent of Expence. or Ports on the Continent of Europe.

Downing-Street, September 6, 1803.

THE King has been pleased to cause it to be fignified by the Right Honorable Lord Hawkefbury, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, to the Ministers of Neutral Powers refiding at this Court, that His Majesty has thought proper, for the Defence of His Dominions, and the Protection of His Subjects, to take the most effectual Measures for the Blockade of the Entrance of the Port of Havre de Grace, and the other Ports of the Seine; and that from this Time all the Measures authorised by the Law of Nations, and the respective Treaties between His Majesty and the different Nentral Powers will be adopted and executed with respect to all Vessels which may attempt to violate the faid Blockade.
