To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's faithful Subjects, the Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of the County of Hereford, animated by the purest Loyalty and Affection for your Person and Government, and roused by the Dangers of our Country, humbly entreat your gracious Acceptance of this Pledge of our Duty and Attachment.

The sudden Recurrence of War, and the possible Renewal of all those Horrors and Cruelties with which one Man's inordinate Ambition has so recently afflicted a large Portion of the civilized World, fills us with the most painful Anxiety. Peace, Sir, is a Blessing dear to our Hearts; and we were preparing to enjoy its Fruits when the violent Hand of a ferocious Foe dashed them untasted from our Lips. We regret the severe Privation, we resent the unjust Aggression, and will endure every Extremity of Distress rather than compromise the substantial Interests, the Honor, and Independence of our Name and Nation.

We trust it is the last Time we shall have to pry such gross Delusions, the last your Majesty will have to punish such enormous Guilt. Cherishing, ourselves, a filial Love and Reverence of that Form of Government, which, for a longer Term than can be paralleled in the Annals of the World, secured to our Forefathers the pure Enjoyment of civil Liberty and social Happiness, we should blush to survive its Integrity or its Independence. Your Majesty's prudent and vigorous Measures for the Defence and Security of that ancient and venerable Fabric, inspire us with Gratitude and Confidence, and bind us by every Exertion within our Power to ensure, under Divine Providence, their complete Success.

Continue then, Sir, to hear unmoved the Calam-

ities and the Threats; and to view without Alarm the extensive Preparations and hostile Movements of a Military Despot; whilst we, your Majesty's loyal Subjects, meet the Strength and Discipline of his invading Legions with the Spirit of our Silurian Ancestors, resolved, like them, in every Danger which may menace our beloved King and Country, to conquer or to perish in their Defence.

#### A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS under the present Circumstances, much Danger may arise to the public Tranquillity from Alien Enemies resorting to, and residing in Great Britain: And whereas by an Act passed in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign, intitled "An Act to repeal an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein; and for establishing, until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein, in certain Cases," due Provision has been made for inflicting Penalties on all such Aliens as shall disobey any Proclamation issued by Us, directing that such Aliens shall depart the United Kingdom: Now We, being desirous of carrying into Execution the Intent and Meaning of the said Act, and thereby providing for the general Safety of the Realm, do, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, order and direct, That all Aliens being Subjects of the French Republic, or of any Place belonging to, or under the Dominion of the Government of the French Republic, or of any Country or Territory at War with Us, who shall have arrived in Great Britain since the First Day of October One thousand eight hundred and one, and on or before this Day the Thirty-first of August (other than such Aliens as are hereinafter excepted), shall depart Great Britain in Manner hereinafter mentioned; that is to say,

All such Aliens residing within the City and Liberties of Westminster, or elsewhere within the Bills of Mortality, or within the Parishes of Saint Mary-le-Bone, Paddington, Pancras, or Saint Luke



at Chelsea, on or before the Fifteenth Day of September One thousand eight hundred and three.

And all such Aliens residing in other Parts of Great Britain (except as hereinafter excepted) shall depart Great Britain on or before the Twentieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred and three.

And We do further declare and make known, that every such Alien who shall knowingly and wilfully refuse or neglect to pay due Obedience to this Our Royal Proclamation, and shall be found in Great Britain contrary to such Proclamation, will be liable to be arrested and committed to the Common Gaol of the County or Place where he or she shall be so arrested, there to remain without Bail or Mainprize until he or she shall be taken in Charge, for the Purpose of being sent out of Great Britain; and if any such Alien sent out of Great Britain in pursuance of this Our Proclamation shall, without Licence for that Purpose by One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, return into any Part of the United Kingdom, such Alien being duly convicted thereof will be liable to be transported for Life according to the Provisions of the said Act.

And in order the better to enable such Aliens to comply with this Our Proclamation and the said Act, We have caused to be provided Ships and Vessels at Gravesend, for conveying such Aliens to some Port or Ports on the Continent of Europe: And all such Aliens as are desirous to avail themselves of this Accommodation are directed to repair to Gravesend on or before the Fourteenth Day of September One thousand eight hundred and three: And all such Aliens repairing to Gravesend, and having obtained their Passports conformably to the said Act, by applying at the Alien Office in Crown Court, Westminster, shall be permitted to embark, and shall be conveyed on board the said Ships to be furnished by Us, free of Expence, to some Port or Ports on the Continent of Europe.

THE King has been pleased to cause it to be signified by the Right Honorable Lord Hawkebury, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, to the Ministers of Neutral Powers residing at this Court, that His Majesty has thought proper, for the Defence of His Dominions, and the Protection of His Subjects, to take the most effectual Measures for the Blockade of the Entrance of the Port of Havre de Grace, and the other Ports of the Seine; and that from this Time all the Measures authorized by the Law of Nations, and the respective Treaties between His Majesty and the different Neutral Powers will be adopted and executed with respect to all Vessels which may attempt to violate the said Blockade.
