To your Majesty's paternal Care and Sollicitude for the Welfare of your People, and to the wise, firm, and decisive Conduct of your Majesty's Councils, we ascribe the enviable State of unparalleled Prosperity to which the Commerce of your Majesty's Dominions has been carried; and we humbly beg Leave to state to your Majesty our full Persuasion that only by Energy, Firmness, and Decision in your Majesty's Measures our Country can be united, our Commerce protected and extended, and our Enemies be made to shrink back ashamed of their Temerity.

We do most sincerely pray the Almighty Disposer of all Events to take your Majesty and your Dominions under his Divine Protection, and to mark the threatened Insults of our audacious Foe to his own Destruction.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the Borough of Boston, in the County of Lincoln.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the ancient Borough of Boston, in Common-Hall assembled, beg Leave at this important Juncture, to offer to your Majesty our most humble and earnest Assurance of continued and cordial Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government.

We contemplate without Dismay, and we are ready to oppose with all the Means in our Power, the meditated Invasion and Violence of a haughty Foe, who dreams of reducing Englishmen under his Tyranny, because he has been permitted thus to deal with Frenchmen. But, different as is our Character, so (we trust) will be our Fate.

We trust, that his Fury will be in vain directed against us, that, by the Blessing of Almighty God, upon your Majesty's wise and vigorous Councils, upon the Valour (hitherto irrefragable) of your Fleets and Armies, and upon the universally concerted Efforts of your faithful Subjects, the Dangers

which now threaten us will be averted, the Malice of our Adversaries will be signally chastised; and they and all the World will be convinced, that Destruction awaits every one who shall attempt to set a hostile Foot upon any of the Shores of your Majesty's United Kingdoms.

Given under our Common Seal, at the Guildhall of the said Borough, the Eleventh Day of August, in the Year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and three.

We pledge ourselves to your Majesty to exert our utmost Endeavours to defeat his unbounded Ambition, and to maintain with Cheerfulness the Religion, Laws, and Liberties of our Country: We most anxiously hope that your Majesty may long reign over a free and united People.

The humble Address of the Inhabitants of the Town of Dock, and Parish of Stoke Damerel, in the County of Devon.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, your Majesty's loyal Subjects, the Inhabitants of the Town of Dock, and Parish of Stoke Damerel, beg to approach your Throne, to express our unfeigned Attachment and Allegiance to your Majesty's Person and Government at the present important Crisis of national Affairs.

It is with the deepest Abhorrence and Indignation that we have observed the dangerous Spirit of Aggrandizement which so strongly marks the Conduct of the French Republic, and we feel most sensibly for the subjugated State of a great Part of Europe, nor are we inclined to lose Sight of the Danger that threatens our own Shores. But a free People can never be dismayed, however daring the Projects, or desperate the Machinations to accomplish their Ruin. Strongly impressed with this noble Sentiment, we shall meet, with the usual Firmness of Britons, the Exigencies of the Times, and shoud deem ourselves unworthy of the high and dignified Rank we hold in the Scale of Nations, did we decline the most active and spirited Exertions in the Defence of our Country, and to shew a Readiness to sacrifice our Lives for the Preservation of your Majesty's
