WE, your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bishop, the Dean and Chapter, and Clergy of the Cathedral Church, and the Clergy of the whole Diocefe of Saint Afaph, beg Permiffion to approach your Royal Prefence, to tellify to your Mojeity the Zeal with which we are animated in common with our Fellow-Subjects of all Ranks and Descriptions for the Defence of your Imperial Crown and of your facred Perfon against foreign War and domestic Treason. To pray for foreign War and domeffic Treafon. the Prefervation of your Majefty's Life, and the Profperity of your Government, to teach the People that their loyal Submission to the Sovereign is indifficult in the second of the bythe Principles of the Religion they profes; these are, among the ordinary Duties of the Ministers of the Gol-pel, incumbent upon them in all Times, and in all Seasons, and most of all in Times of public Danger and Diffurbance, and in these we trust we have not been wanting.
