To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff and Grand Jury of the County of Cork, assembled at Summer Assizes One thousand eight hundred and three.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff and Grand Jury of the County of Cork, assembled at Summer Assizes One thousand eight hundred and three, humbly beg Leave to avail ourselves of this Opportunity to reiterate our Assurances of inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person, Family, and Government, and to declare to your Majesty the just Indignation with which this County has viewed the late abominable, but happily abortive, Efforts of our insidious Enemy, to animate the Embers of his expiring Interest in this County, by exciting an Insurrection in the Capital, which, although partial in its Extent, and contemptible in its Influence, has, in the Murder of the great and good Kilwarden, been marked with a Spirit of disgraceful and disgusting Ferocity.

In this Attempt we recognize the wily Artifice, the vindictive Zeal, and the restless Malignity which have uniformly characterized the Hostility of the perfidious Power we have to contend with,—who has consigned to the Machinations of Treason and of Art his Hopes of enslaving a Country that has defied both his Threats and his Arms. We venture to assure your Majesty that Treason will be confounded, and that Loyalty and Liberty will triumph.

We contemplate with Exultation the Effect which the late Insurrection has produced. The Energy of the Nation is aroused. The Apathy of Indulgence is discarded; and in the mild and dignified Administration of Justice which has followed the Phrenzy of Rebellion, the signal Superiority of our venerated Constitution is happily contrasted with the wild and sanguinary System of those who would endeavour to subvert it.

For the Preservation of that Constitution, for the Maintenance of your Majesty's just Rights and those of the Empire, we confidently proclaim, there is in the Country an ample Fund of affectionate Loyalty and of enthusiastic Devotion.

We know that we contend for every Blessing and every Comfort that can render Life amiable or interesting, against the profligate Usurpation of an Individual who aims at the Destruction of all human

Happiness, and we desire our Enjoyments only, as we are determined to defend them.
