

dated the 8th Day of January 1802, by which the said Sixth Article of the Treaty of Amity was declared to be cancelled and annulled, came in place of the said Sixth Article, and was concluded on the Part of His Majesty for the Benefit of those Persons within the Description of the said Sixth Article, whose Claims might have been made good under the same; the Amount of the Sum agreed by the said Convention to be paid by the United States having been settled, with a View to the known Amount of such Claims, and the Proceedings which had taken place thereupon in America, under the Commission authorized by the said Sixth Article, and accepted of by His Majesty, "in Satisfaction and Discharge of the Money which the United States might have been liable to pay, in pursuance of the Provisions of the said Sixth Article;" that the said United States could not, in pursuance of the Provisions of the said Sixth Article, have been made liable to pay to Persons who had never claimed under the same; so that if Claims were received and held good under the Convention in Behalf of Persons, who, notwithstanding the regular and uninterrupted Sittings, at Philadelphia, of the Commissioners under the said Sixth Article, during the whole Course of the Terms of Eighteen Months and Six Months, thereby prescribed for the Reception of Claims, and the public Notices thereof repeatedly given in the Manner set forth in the said Order of this Board of the 9th Day of May last, had never claimed under the said Article, such Persons would, in consequence of the subsequent Interruption of the Proceedings under the said Article, derive a Benefit which they never could have received from the full and complete Execution thereof, to the Prejudice of those who had duly observed and complied with the Terms and Conditions of the same, and whose Claims formed the Charge on which the said Convention was concluded as beforementioned,—that therefore no Claim for any Share of the Money to be distributed by this Board, under the said Convention, can be received, which was not preferred under the said Sixth Article of the Treaty of Amity.
