dated the 8th Day of January 1802, by which the faid Sixth Article of the Treaty of Amity was declared to be cancelled and annulled, came in place of the faid Sixth Article, and was concluded on the Part of His Majefty for the Benefit of those Perfons within the Defcription of the faid Sixth Article, whofe Claims might have been made good under the fame; the Amount of the Sum agreed by the faid Convention to be paid by the United States having been fettled, with a View to the known Amount of fuch Claims, and the Proceedjugs which had taken place thereupon in America, under the Commission authorized by the faid Sixth Article, and accepted of by His Majelty, "in Sa-" tisfaction and Difcharge of the Money which the "United States might have been liable to pay, in "purfuance of the Provisions of the faid Sixth "Article;" that the faid United States could not. in purfuance of the Provisions of the faid Sixth Article, have been made liable to pay to Perfons who had never claimed under the fame; fo that if Claims were received and held good under the Con-

vention in Behalf of Persons, who, notwithstanding the regular and uninterrupted Sittings, at Philadel-phia, of the Commissioners under the faid Sixth Article, during the whole Course of the Terms of Eighteen Months and Six Months, thereby pre-fcribed for the Reception of Claims, and the public Notices thereof repeatedly given in the Manner fet forth in the faid Order of this Board of the 9th Day of May laft, had never claimed under the faid Article, fuch Perfons would, in confequence of the fublequent Interruption of the Proceedings under the faid Article, derive a Bencht which they never could have received from the full and complete Execution thereof, to the Prejudice of those who had duly observed and complied with the Terms and Conditions of the fame, and whole Claims formed the Charge on which the faid Convention was coneluded as beforementioned,-that therefore no Claim for any Share of the Money to be diffributed by this Board, under the faid Convention, can be received, which was not preferred under the faid
