

Hamburg, Nov. 12. The Letters from *Sweden* tell us, That the King having proposed to the States the reannexing to the Crown all such Lands as have been alienated by his Predecessors; the Nobility, who are most of them concerned, did very earnestly oppose it; and that it was like to occasion great Contentions. Count *Ansbony* of *Oldenburg* dyed some days since at *Oldenburg*, without Issue, which may occasion great Disputes. From *Berlin* they write, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* had resolved to raise six new Regiments.

Amsterdam, Nov. 15. The Merchants concerned in the Trade of the *Meuse* have obtained a Copy of the Letter, written by the Elector of *Cologne*, in answer to that he received from this State, concerning the new Imposition of the sixth Penny, which is look'd upon by them as a thing that is very grievous, and they will present to the States the Reasons they have for it. In the mean time this Matter has occasioned great disturbances at *Liege*, and may have other ill consequences, if timely Remedies be not applied by the Elector of *Cologne*; who its said, has demanded Assistance of the French King, and that he has promised it.

Hague, Nov. 15. The Duke of *Neuburg* has again written to the States-General, concerning the Arrears of Subsidies, which he pretends, and presses them to give effectual and speedy Orders for the payment of, intimating his Resolution, in case they do not, to transfer his Right to some other Prince. The States are now considering of the Advice they lately received from their Ambassador at the French Court, concerning the difference that was pretended to be made between him and the Ambassadors of *Venice* and *Savoy*, as to the Ceremonious part of his Reception, who as well as he, had only the Character of Ordinary Ambassador; and its thought that the States to avoid all difficulties, will give him that of Extraordinary. The Resident of this State at *Stockholme*, has by his last Letters given the States an Account, that he doubted not but the Ratifications of the Treaty of Commerce concluded between the King of *Sweden* and them, would now be speedily exchanged; which has been so long delayed; that many people began to believe, that the Crown of *Sweden* was resolved not to Ratify that Treaty.

Brussels, Nov. 12. Our Governor the Prince of *Parma* is making an Agreement with the several Provinces, concerning their respective Propositions to be paid towards the maintainance of the Army for the next year, which they say will be perfected in three or four days, and then he will make a great Reform, especially of the Cavalry, by reducing several Regiments that are very small, and incorporating the Soldiers into other Bodies, and when that's done, new Levies will be made, to make up the number of Forces, which its resolved shall be constantly kept on foot, for the Defence and Security of these Provinces. Don *Bernardo de Salinas* is still here, and endeavours to put off his Journey to *Denmark*, because of the illness of the weather. The disorders at *Liege* grow higher and higher, and will in all probability end in a Revolt, if not speedily and vigorously prevented by their Prince. We are told that the Duke of *Hanover* is going for *Italy*, and the Prince his eldest Son for *England*.

Paris, Nov. 13. The Dauphin is not yet perfectly recovered of his Ague, and the Dauphiness conti-

nues likewise ill. The Prince of *Conde* is very well again, and has been to wait upon the King. The Marquis de *Fereza* is arrived here in quality of Ambassador from the Duke of *Savoy*; People speak still somewhat doubtfully of the Marriage of that Prince with the Infanta of *Portugal*. The loss of so many Merchant Ships as perished in a Hurricane in *August* last in the *West Indies*, has undone several Families at *Rochelle*, to which place most of those Ships did belong. From *Rome* we have Advice of the death of Cardinal *Caraffa*, which this Court is troubled at, having, as is thought, designed him for the Papacy, in case he had outlived the present Pope. He was 70 years old, and by his death there are 22 Places vacant in the College of Cardinals.

Deal, Nov. 7. Yesterday it blew very hard; and those Ships that could get up their Ankers, failed, as all the rest did this morning, so that there are not any Ships now left in the Downs.

The Officers of the Receipt of His Majesties Exchequer, have Money in Bank to pay to Number 212 inclusive, of the Orders Registered on the Second Act for Disbanding the Army.
