large Gun Brig, were d'scovered coming out of Etaples, and standing to the Eastward towards Boulogue, I immediately made the Harpy's Signal to chase, as well as the Lark's, who was joining to Leeward, to chase in that Direction. The Admiral Mitchell Cutter I perceived off Boulogue, and Lieutenant Shippard, her Commander, immediately ran down within Musket-Shot and commenced a very fpirited and well directed Attack upon the Brig and Sloops, which as continued in the most gallant Manner for Two Hours and a Half, driving the Brig and one of the Sloops on the Rocks. I have great Pleafure in bearing Tcftimony to the Jutrepidity which was difplayed in attacking to superior a Force, especially when under Cover of their numerous Batteries on Shore, and feel myfelf bound in Justice to Lieutenant Shippard for his gallant Conduct this Day, to recommend him to your Lordship as an Officer highly deferving every Thing I can fay in his Favor.

I enclose his Report to me, and am forry to perseive he has suffered so confiderably; I regret the itrong Winds off Shore prevented the Squadron from rendering that Afficance we were all anxious

N executing the Orders of Rear-Admiral Montagu, while close in off Eoulogne, I this Morning, at Nine o'Clock, observed Seven Vessels, which I took for Gun-Boats, coming from the Westward, intending, as a supposed, to form a Junction with those already in the Road, and as the Wind was E. S. E. I flood along Shore with an Intention of keeping them in Play till the Squadron came up.

They turned out to be Sloops and Schooners, Some of which were armed, under the Convoy of a Gun Brig of Twelve Thirty-two Pounders, which we brought to Action at Ten, close under the Batteries at Patel, and, after engaging them Two Hours and a Half, drove her, with One of the Sloops, on Shore, under the Fire of their Batteries .and Musketry.

As this happened immediately under the Camp, I was not a little gratified to observe the Hills covered with Troops as far as I could fee them.

In the Conflict a Shell fell on board of us, which has wounded our Mast and Cross Jack-Yard in several Places; our Sails and Rigging are a good deal cut up with their Grape; they have difmounted one Gun, and hulled us in feveral Places.

I am forry to add we have two Men badly wounded, one with the Loss of a I eg, and the Mate with two others slightly; all of whose Conduct, with the Rest of the Crew (I hirty-sive in all), deserve my warmelt Approbation.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. . HEREAS Information hath been received that an Infectious Distemper is now raging in the City of New York, in the State of New York, within the United States of America: And whereas by an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth and whereas by an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for erecting a Lazaret on Chetney Hill, in the County of Kent, and for reducting into one Act the Laws relating to Quatrantine, and for making further Provision "therein." It is among other Things enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by His Royal Proclamation, from Time to Time, to declare any Infectious Distemper, the Communicaclare any Infectious Distemper, the Communica-tion whereof may be highly dangerous to the Health of His Majesty's Subjects, to be of the Nature of the Plague.

His Majesty, in pursuance of the said Power, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, deems it expedient to declare, and doth hereby declare, that the said Infectious Distemper is of the Nature of the Plague:

And His Majesty doth therefore hereby order, that all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes now arrived, or which may hereafter arrive in any of the Ports of Great Britain, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man from New York, or any Port within the State of New York, and shall have cleared out from New York, or any Port within the State of New York, subsequent to the Fisteenth Day of August last, (not having any Person or Persons on board the same actually ill of the said Fever,) do perform a Quarantine of Fourteen Days at the several Places appointed, and according to the Rules prescribed by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twentyninth of July One thousand eight hundred, for Per-
