Cadiz, Nov, 9.

Ive days fince Sir John Berry in the Lebpard failed from hence with the Smirna Ships, and feveral other Merchantmen under his Convoy for England; and in three or four days Capt. Killigrew in the Forefight, will fuil with feveral other Merchants Ships, that were not ready to go with Sir John Berry.

Turin, Nov. 23. The 18th Inflant arrived here the Cardinal d'Effree from France in his way to Rome. The Marquis de Dronero, whom our Duke is fending his Ambaflador to Portugal, expects a French man of War at Nizza, to transport him thither.

Warfam, Nov. 8. The 4th Instant arrived here Count Morstein, Great Treasurer of the Crown, from his Emballic in France, whither he was fent, upon the prospect there was of this Kingdons engaging in a War joyntly with the Moleovites against the Turks, to defire the affiftance of the French King; what fucces he has had in his Negotiation, we cannot certainly fay, but according to what appears, it has not been such, as may give this Crown any great encouragement to purfue the Refolutions it was thought were once taken, for the joyning with the Moscovites in the faid War. Here is now an Ambaffador from the Cham of Tartary, who comes to demand the payment of a fum of Money, which he pretends was promifed upon the conclusion of the last Peace with the Turks, to be paid him yearly. Our Ambaffador is returning home from Molcow, and when we confider how deaf the Muscovites have been to the Proposals he made to them, for the entring into a Defensive and Offenfive Allyanco, we may well believe that they have already concluded a Peace with the Turks, or at leaft, have good affurances of doing it.

Stockholme, Nov. 13. The States Affembled here, having prayed the King, more fully to Declare ·himfelf upon the Heads that wore propoled to them at the opening of their Affembly; his Muefly in answer thereunto has let them know, That he expects a Supply of five Millions of Crowns, to be employed by him as the Exigencies of the State . fhall require; That he thinks it necessary to have a Navy of Threefcore and ten men of War, and a , Land-Army of as many thousand Men; belides the forreign Troops he intends to raile for the ftrengthning his Frontier Garrifons. In order whereunto, the States have called for an Account of feveral great fums of Money, expended during the Kings Minority, from the perfons through whole hands it palled, who, its believed will be found in great Arrears. The Nobility offer a very confiderable fum of Money, upon condition they may remain in the policilion of the Crown-Lands, which have been alienated by the Kings Predeceffors,

Lintz, Nov. 26: Two days fince arrived here an Express from Hungary with Advice, that a Cellation of Arms had been again agreed between General Caprara who Commands the Emperors Forces, and the Hungarian Malecontents; and that it was hoped a Peace would follow, in case the Emperor would confent to some points, concerning the fecurity of their Religion, which they chiefly infift on: The new Levies that are making for the Emperor, advance very well; and its faid, that by Spring they will be fanished, and that if there be occasion, his Imperial Majesty will be able to bring a very great Army into the Field

Ratibonne, Nov 23. The Dyet has received an Anlwer from the Emperor to the Refolution of the Three Colledges, concerning the regulating the Moneys that are current in the Empire, by which his Imperial Majelly lets them know, that he does not think fit to make any alteration therein in his Hereditary Countreys; The Circle's of Franconia, Bavaria, and Suabia, are now Affembled at Aufbarg, to take fome Refolution in this Matter. The Dyet has reprefented to the Emperor, the Complaint made to them by the Elector of Cologne, againif the States-General of the United Provinces, who continue to poffel, fome places belonging to him in the Countrey of Liege, on account of Contributions that are due to them.

Strasburg, Nov. 29. The French have let up leveral Cultom-Houles on the *Rhine*, as at Seliz, *Rhinheim*, Friefenkeim, and Germerscheim, which put the Merchauts into a great deal of pain, apprehending that great Imp fittions will be laid upon their Goods and Merchandizes that pass that way. Two days fince arrived here the Marquis de Seppewille, who is going to the Emperors Court, In the quality of Envoye Extraordinary from the French King, and in a day or two will be held a general Review of the French Dragoons in Allace, at Ober-Ensheim. The Duke of Hanover is pait through this City in his way to Italy.

Cologne, Dec. 3. The two Butgermallers who are prifoners, defend themlelves hitherto very well, against the profecution of the Burghers; the third, who made his eleape, has been sectored by order of the Duke of *fuliers* in his Territories, and fent hither; what illue this Affair will have, a short time will now shew. In the mean time, the Magistrates have propoled to the Burghers, the raising of Soldiers to reinforce the Militia, but these have answered them with a Complaint, that Moreys are wanting. Mr. Berlie, Envoye Extraordhary, from the King of England, is Itill here; but will part from hence in a day or two; he goes to Coblema, Mentz, and Heydelberg, and afterwards to Berlin.

Hamburg, Dec. 3. We are every h ur expecti .

to hear that the Dance have evacuated Wifmar; the Swedes Troops that are to take polieflion of it, are ready, and Count Comingfmark, is gone thither to fee that things be done according to what has been flipulated. We have Advice that the Plague begins to decrease at Leipzick; there having dyed not above 116 the laft week. From Berlin they write, that Prince Louis, the Elector of Brandenburgs fc cond Son, was gone with a great Equipage to Prufia, to visit the Princels Radzeville, with whom it is faid he is to Marry. That the differences between the Crown of spain and his Electoral Highnels, continued in the fame flate, without any prospect of an Ac-commodation; that it was believed the Elector would proceed to dispose of the Spanish Ship, taken in the Road of Offend, and of the Goods in her, in part of fatisfaction for the Debt he pretends due to him from the Crown of Spain. Here has been feed within these few days a Blazing Star.

Hague, Decemb. 6. The States of Holland are separated for eight days, and the feveral Deputies are gone home to confult their Principals, concerning the flate of the War which is proposed by the Council of State for the next year. The City of Liege has given this State fresh assurances that they will not confent to the Imposition of the both penny, laid upon them by their Prince, which the Merchants of this Countrey, who are chiefly con-cerned in the Trade of the Menfe, are well pleafed with: The Sieur Lente, who has for some time refided here, on the part of the King of Denmark, is gone for England, with the Character of Envoye Extraordinary from that King. The Elector of  $\zeta_{\theta_2}$ logne has by his Minifler here, defired the States to Ratific the Agreement lately made by their Commissioners, concerning the Rights and Jurisdictions which his Electoral Highnels claims at Matfricht. From the North we have an account, that the Elector of Brandenburg is fending feveral Troops towards the Countrey of Cleves.

Bruffels, Dec. 3. On Saturday last the Count d'Archinto and Don Bernardo de Salinas went hence to Antwerp, to prefs that City not to delay any longer their conlent to the Subfidies that are demanded, for the maintenance of the Troops, but we do not hear that they have as yet made any great all vance in that matter. The Prince of Parma's indifpolition continues, being now turned to a Quartan Ague, of which he had a Fit the laft night, that held him 7 hours. We have already given you an Account, . that the Governor of Luxemburg had put a Garrifon into a place called Ferten, which the French madea pretention to, to preferve it from falling into their hands, and that the French had thereupon Declared, that if the faid Garrison was not drawn out of the place, they would bring their Troops into the Countrey of Luxemburg and right themfelves, for the doing of which, they allowed the Governor of that Province 40 days, which are now going to expire ; and its feared the French will, as they have threatened, make use of Force to poffels themfelves of what they pretend to. In the mean time they are buying up a valt quantity of Corn at Maestricht and other places on the Meuse, and are filing up their Magazines on that fide, with Provisions of all forts. We have advice, that the Elector of Brandenburg has given Orders for the

Marching of feveral Regiments towards his Countiev of Cleves.

Paris, Dec. 7. The King has appointed the Sieur d'Oppede to go his Ambafiador to the Prince Regent of Portugal. The Counters d' Armagnae is returned to Court, where the has not been their y or 10 years. Whitebal, Dec. 1. YRerday William Viscount Stafford (one of the five Lords, impeached by the Houle of Commons, for the horrid Popilh Plot againfi the Kings Perfon, the Protestant Religion and Government ) was brought to his Tryal before the Lords in Parliament; a Committee of the Commons managing the Impeachment against him. That day was taken up in opening the Court, and in hearing the general Evidence, to prove the faid Popilh Plot. This day the Witneffes that prove the particular Charge against the Lord . Stafford, were heard and examined.; and between three and four a clotk in the afternoon the Court again Adjourned till to morrow.
