His Majefly's Ship Inconflant, Goree, Africa, 15th March 1804.

My Lord, BEG Leave to acquaint your Lordship with the Recapture of the Island of Goree, and I have the Honor to inclose you the Articles of Capitulation.

I have appointed Captain William Murray, the Senior Officer of the African Corps, Commandant of Gorce, until His Majesty's Pleafure is known ; and as I had not any Directions relative to the Cargo of the Eagle, Store-Ship, I took the Liberty to open the Letter addreffed to Colonel Frazer, from your Lordfhip, and have given it to Captain Murray, and or-dered him to follow, as clofe as poffible, the Directions contained therein. The very ample fupply of Stores and Provitions this Veffel appears to have brought out, and the great Strength of the Garrison at prefent; enables me to affure your Lordship of its perfect Se-

curity. Mr. Charles Pickford, my Firft Lieutenant, an intelligent and deferving Officer, and whom I beg leave to recommend to your Lordship, will have the Honor of presenting this Letter. He will be able to inform you very fully of every Particular relative to Goree and its Dependencies.

I hope the Arrangement I have made will meet your Lordship's Approbation.
