THE following Intelligence has been received at the East India-House, from Bengal:

To His Excellency the Most Noble Marquis Wellesley,
Governor-General, &c. &c. &c.

MY LORD,

MY Dispatches of the 24th and 25th Instant*, will have informed your Lordship of the complete Success of our Operations against the Town and Fort of Deig.

I attribute our early Possession of this strong Fortrefs, entirely to the Panic which the Garrison experienced, on witnessing the irresistible Valour and Intrepidity of our Troops in carrying by Assault the Outwork, and storming their numerous Batteries, under the Walls of the Town, which were supported by extensive Entrenchments, occupied by a large Force, consisting of several of the Rajah of Bhurtpore's Battalions, and the remaining Infantry of Jeswunt Rao Holkar. The Number of the Enemy killed on the Night of the 23d Instant was immense.

The ardent Zeal, Energy, and irresistible Valour, which has marked the Conduct of our Officers and Troops employed on this Occasion, under Circumstances of peculiar Difficulty and Danger, must ever reflect on them the highest Credit; and the Benefit the Nation has received from their exemplary and heroic Behaviour, must be Matter of proud Exultation to every Well-wisher of the British Empire.

Too much Praise cannot be bestowed on every Corps engaged, for the perfect Regularity with which this Service was performed.

I found it necessary to divide the Force destined for this Service into Three Columns, the Whole moving off so as to reach the different Points of Attack a little before Twelve at Night.

The Right Column, under Captain Kelly, consisting of Four Battalion Companies of the Honorable Company's European Regiments, and Five Companies of the 1st Battalion 12th Regiment Native Infantry, was ordered to carry the Enemy's Batteries and Trenches on the high Ground to the Left of the Town. The Success of this Party was complete, and entitles Captain Kelly to every Praise for the

Manner in which it was conducted, and for the Coolness and Gallantry he displayed under every trying Circumstance, exposed to a heavy Fire from Artillery, which was defended with desperate Resolution. Captain Raban, of the Artillery, who accompanied this Party for the Purpose of spiking or bringing off the captured Ordnance, particularly signalized himself on this dangerous Service.

The Left Column, under Major Radcliffe, consisting of the remaining Four Battalion Companies of the Honorable Company's European Regiment, and Five Companies of the 1st Battalion 12th Regiment Native Infantry, was destined to carry the Trenches and Batteries on the Enemy's Right. This Column was equally successful with that opposed to their Left; and the Service was performed with equal Gallantry and Spirit, and reflects infinite Credit on Major Radcliffe.

The Centre Column, led by Lieutenant-Colonel Macrae, (who had the general Command of the Whole,) consisting of the Flank Companies of His Majesty's 22d, 76th, and of the Honorable Company's European Regiment, and of the 1st Battalion 8th Regiment Native Infantry, composed the storming Party.

I have hardly Words to express my Sense of the Conduct of this Party, who, under a galling Fire, on their Flanks, of Cannon and Musketry from the Enemy's Batteries and Trenches, and over broken and extremely unfavourable Ground, rushed on to the Breach, and gained Possession of the Work, with a Spirit and Ardour which must have ensured Success whatever might have been the Opposition.

I feel myself under the greatest Obligations to Lieutenant-Colonel Macrae, to whose Conduct on this Occasion I attribute the ultimate Success of the Attack.

Lieutenant-Colonel Ball, who commanded the 1st Battalion 8th Regiment Native Infantry, is entitled to the greatest Praise for the Activity and Spirit he displayed in leading on his Men; and for the able Assistance he rendered Colonel Macrae, in the Adoption of such Measures as became afterwards necessary to secure us in Possession of the Place. It is with sincere Grief I add, that this valuable Officer received a severe, though, I trust, not dangerous Wound, but which will, I fear, deprive me of his Services for some Time.

The Conduct of Captain Lindsay, of His Majesty's 22d Regiment, has been represented to me as highly meritorious; I lament to add that this gallant Officer is likewise wounded.

It is unnecessary for me to detail more fully the Conduct of Individuals on a Service where Merit has been, throughout all Ranks, so eminently conspicuous; but I feel it my Duty to draw your Lordship's Attention to the Services rendered by Lieutenant Colonel Horsford, commanding the Artillery, to whose professional Knowledge and Activity throughout this Siege, and on every other Occasion, I feel infinitely indebted, as well as to the whole of that Corps, for their spirited and unremit- ted Exertions.

The Officers of the Engineer Department, Captain Robertson and Lieutenant Smith, have peculiar Merit, and are entitled to my best Thanks and Ap- probation.

The Corps of Pioneers, under the Orders of Cap- tain Swinton, command my warmest Praise, for the Chearfulness with which they performed their labo- rious Duties, and particularly for the Alacrity they displayed on the Night of the 23d Instant. Too much Credit cannot be bestowed on Captain Swin- ton, who on this and every former Occasion has been most zealous and active. I am sorry to add that this excellent Officer is severely wounded, as is Lieutenant Forrest, of the same Corps, whose Con- duct was equally meritorious.

Your Lordship will, I am confident, receive much Pleasure in learning the highly exemplary Conduct of the Three Corps of British Cavalry in Camp, the whole of whom volunteered their Services as work- ing Parties for the Trenches and Batteries, and as- sisted very materially in accelerating our Operations against this Place; they have received my sincere Thanks for their Exertions, and for a Zeal so ho- norable to the British Character.

I have the Honor to enclose Returns of the Killed and Wounded during the Siege, and on the Night of the Assault, with a Return of the cap- tured Ordnance, &c.

The Fugitives, composed of the Rajah of Burt- pore's Battalions, and his Garrison, with the Re- mainder of Jeswant Rao Holkar's Infantry, ap- peared generally to have taken the Direction of Burtpore. By every Information, great Numbers have deserted, and I do not imagine they will again attempt to oppose us. I shall move towards Burt- pore as soon as possible.

Before I conclude this Dispatch, I beg Leave to mention to your Lordship the very spirited Conduct of Mr. Metcalf, of the Civil Service. He volun- teered to accompany the storming Party, and was, I am informed, among the foremost who ascended the Breach.

MY LORD,

I HAVE the Honor to inform your Lordship, that, in consequence of the Breach in the Wall of the Town being reported practicable, I determined on storming the Place Yesterday Evening. I chose this Time, in order to prevent the Enemy from stockading the Breach during the Night, which had hitherto been the Case.

I am sorry to add, that Obstacles of an insurmountable Nature were opposed to the Storming Party on their Arrival at the Breach, the Water in the Ditch was exceedingly deep; this Difficulty however was speedily surmounted, and the Party gained the Foot of the Breach; but though every Exertion was made by both Officers and Men, the Breach was so imperfect, that every Effort to gain the Top proved fruitless, and the Column, after making several Attempts with heavy Loss, was obliged to retire, which they did in excellent Order, to our Battery.

Among the many brave Men who have fallen on this Occasion, it is with sincere Grief I report the Death of Lieutenant-Colonel Maitland, of the 75th Regiment, who commanded the Storming Party; his Exertions are described by all, to have been of a Nature the most heroic, and his Example animated the Men to persevere in their Attempts, which nothing but Difficulties, of a Nature the most unexpected, could have rendered unsuccessful. This gallant Officer, though he had received several severe Wounds, continued to exert himself until he received a Shot in the Head, which proved instantaneously mortal.

Although we unfortunately failed in gaining Possession of the Place, we were not wholly unsuccessful; a Flanking Column on the Right, under the Orders of Major Hawkes, gained Possession of the Enemy's Battery, and succeeded in spiking and disabling their Guns, and in destroying the greatest Part of the Enemy who were opposed to them.

I beg to assure your Lordship, that the Conduct of our Officers and Men employed last Night, has been as exemplary as on every former Occasion; but Circumstances of an unexpected and unfortunate Nature occurred, which their utmost Efforts could not surmount, but I hope in a very few Days their excellent Conduct will be rewarded by the Possession of the Place.

YOU will please to acquaint the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty of the Arrival, this Day, of His Majesty's Ship Loire, and Three Privateers, Two Spanish and One French.

I herewith transmit Captain Maitland's Letter, enclosing one from Lieutenant Yeo, First Lieutenant of the Loire, giving an Account of the Capture of the above Vessels, as well as of his most judicious and prompt Decision in entering the Bay of Muros; and by the most active and daring Gallantry on the Part of Captain Maitland and Lieutenant Yeo, and the Officers and Ship's Company of the Loire, taking the Forts which defended the Bay; the Particulars of which are therein detailed: also another Letter from Captain Maitland, describing the very gallant Attack made by Lieutenant Yeo, in the Boats of the Loire, on a Spanish Felucca and small Privateer, under the Enemy's Batteries, accompanied with Lists of the Killed and Wounded, and a List of Vessels captured and destroyed.

His Majesty's Ship Loire, off Cape Finisterre, June 2, 1805.

SIR,

I HAVE to inform you, that, after delivering the Dispatches Lord Gardner charged me with to Sir Robert Calder, in stretching to the Westward to regain my Station, a small Vessel was discovered standing into the Bay of Camarinas, to the Eastward of Cape Finisterre. Being quite calm after Dark, I sent the Launch and Two Cutters, under Mr. Yeo, First Lieutenant, assisted by Lieutenant Mallock of the Marines, and Messrs. Clinch, Herbert, and Mildridge, Midshipmen, to endeavour to bring her out. From the Intricacy of the Passage, the Boats did not get up till Break of Day, when they found Two small Privateers moored under a Battery of Ten Guns; undaunted, however, by a Circumstance so little expected, Mr. Yeo ordered the Launch, commanded by Mr. Clinch, to board the smallest, while he, with the Two Cutters, most gallantly attacked and carried the largest, a Felucca armed with Three Eighteen-Pounders, Four Four-Pounder Brass Swivels and Fifty Men.

The Launch had the same Success in her Attack, the Fort immediately opened a Fire, so ill directed, however, as to do little Damage. Being still perfectly calm close under the Guns of the Battery, and no Possibility of receiving Assistance from the Ship, Mr. Yeo was under the painful Necessity of abandoning the smallest Vessel, a Lugger of Two Six-Pounders and Thirty-two Men, to secure the Felucca, which, I am happy to add, was effected with only Three Men, William Turner, James Gardner, Quarter-Master, and John Maynes, Marine, slightly wounded.

The Loss on board the Luggers cannot be ascertained. When the Crew of the Felucca was mustered, Nineteen out of Fifty were missing, some of whom had jumped overboard, but the greatest Part were killed by the Pike, there being no Weapons used but the Pike and Sabre.

When we call to mind the Inequality of Force, Officers included, there being not more than Thirty-five of the Loire's opposed to Eighty Spaniards, with their Vessels moored to the Walls of a heavy Battery, it must be allowed to confer the greatest Credit on the Officers and Men employed on the Service.

Mr. Yeo, in coming out, took Possession of Three small Merchant Vessels, but finding their Cargoes consisted only of small Wine for the Enemy's Squadron at Ferrol, I have destroyed them. The Name of the Privateer captured is the Esperanza alias San Pedro of Corunna. She is quite new, only out Four Days, and was victualled and stored for a Cruise of one Month.

Mr. Yeo assures me that he was assisted by Mr. Mallock, with the greatest Bravery, and gives the highest Praise to Mr. Clinch for the Gallantry and Promptness with which he carried his Orders into Execution in the Launch. He also speaks in the warmest Terms of the Officers and other Men under his Command.

*His Majesty's Ship, Loire, at Anchor,
Murros Road, Spain, June 4, 1805.*

SIR,
BEING informed that there was a French Privateer, of Twenty-six Guns, fitting out at Murros, and nearly ready for Sea, it struck me, from my Recollection of the Bay (having been in it formerly, when Lieutenant of the Kingsfisher), as being practicable either to bring her out or destroy her, with the Ship I have the Honor to command. I accordingly prepared Yesterday Evening for engaging at Anchor, and appointed Mr. Yeo, First Lieutenant, with Lieutenants Mallocks and Douglas, of the Marines, and Mr. Clinch, Master's Mate, to head the Boarders and Marines, amounting, Officers included, to Fifty Men (being all that could be spared from anchoring the Ship and working the Guns), in landing and storming the Fort, though I then had no Idea its Strength was so great as it has proved. At Nine this Morning, on the Sea-Breeze setting in, I stood for the Bay in the Ship, the Men previously prepared being in the Boats ready to shove off. On hauling close round the Point of the Road, a small Battery of Two Guns opened a Fire on the Ship; a few Shot were returned, but perceiving it would annoy us considerably, from its Situation, I desired Mr. Yeo to push on Shore and spike the Guns, reminding the Men of its being the Anniversary of their Sovereign's Birth, and that, for his Sake, as well as their own Credit, their utmost Exertions must be used. Though such an Injunction was unnecessary, it had a great Effect in animating and raising the Spirits of the People. As the Ship drew in, and more fully opened the Bay, I perceived a very long Corvette, of Twenty-six Ports, apparently nearly ready for Sea, and a large Brig, of Twenty Ports, in a State of fitting, but neither of them firing,

led me to conclude they had not their Guns on board, and left no other Object to occupy my Attention but a heavy Fort, which, at this Moment, opened to our View, within less than a Quarter of a Mile, and began a wonderfully well directed Fire, almost every Shot taking place in the Hull. Perceiving that, by standing further on, more Guns would be brought to bear upon us, without our being enabled to near the Fort so much as I wished, I ordered the Helm to be put down, and when, from the Way she had, we had gained an advantageous Position, anchored with a Spring, and commenced firing. Although we have but little Doubt that, before long, we should have silenced the Fort, yet from the Specimen they gave us, and being completely embrasured, it must have cost us many lives, and great Injury to the Ship, had not Mr. Yeo's Gallantry and great Conduct soon put an End to their Fire.

I must now revert to him and the Party under his Command; having landed under the small Battery on the Point, it was instantly abandoned, but hardly had he Time to spike the Guns, when, at the Distance of a Quarter of a Mile, he perceived a regular Fort, ditched, and with a Gate, which the Enemy (fortunately never suspecting our Landing) had neglected to secure, open a Fire upon the Ship; without waiting for Orders he pushed forward, and was opposed at the Inner Gate by the Governor, with such Troops as were in the Town, and the Crews of the French Privateers. From the Testimony of the Prisoners as well as our own Men, it appears that Mr. Yeo was the first that entered the Fort, with One Blow laid the Governor dead at his Feet, and broke his own Sabre in two; the other Officers were dispatched by such Officers and Men of ours as were most advanced, and the Narrowness of the Gate would permit, to push forward; the Remainder instantly fled to the further End of the Fort, where, from the Ship, we could perceive many of them leap from the Embrasures upon the Rocks, (a Height of above Twenty-five Feet) such as laid down their Arms received Quarter. For a more particular Account of the Proceedings of Mr. Yeo and his Party, I beg leave to refer you to his Letter enclosed herewith, and have to request you will be pleased to recommend him to the Notice of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty; being a very old Officer, and in the Two late Instances has displayed as much Gallantry as ever fell to the Lot of any Man; he speaks in the strongest Language of the Officers and Men under his Command on Shore, and I feel it but justice to attribute our Success wholly to their Exertions; for although the Fire from the Ship was admirably directed, the Enemy were so completely covered by their Embrasures, as to render the Grape almost ineffectual.

The Instant the Union was displayed at the Fort I sent and took Possession of the Enemy's Vessels in the Road, consisting of the Constance French Ship Privateer, pierced for Twenty-six Twelves and Nines, none of which however were on board; the Bellier, a French Privateer Brig, pierced for Twenty Eighteen Pound Carronades; and a Spanish Merchant Brig in Ballast. I then hoisted a Flag of Truce, and sent to inform the Inhabitants of the Town, that, if they would deliver up such Stores of the Ship as were on Shore there would be no further Molesta-

tion; the Proposal was thankfully agreed to. I did not, however, think it advisable to allow the People to remain long enough to embark the Guns, there being a large Body of Troops in the Vicinity. A great many small Vessels are in the Bay and hauled up on the Beach, none of them having Cargoes of any Value, I conceive it an Act of Inhumanity to deprive the poorer Inhabitants of the Means of gaining their Livelihood, and shall not molest them. On inspecting the Brig, as she had only the lower Rigging over Head, and was not in a State of Forwardness, I found it impracticable to bring her away, and therefore set Fire to her: She is now burnt to the Water's Edge. I cannot conclude my Letter without giving the Portion of Credit that is their due to the Officers and Men on board the Ship. They conducted themselves with the greatest Steadiness and Coolness; and, although under a heavy Fire, pointed their Guns with the utmost Precision: there being hardly a Shot that did not take Effect. To Lieutenants Lawe and Bertram I feel much indebted, as well as to Mr. Shea the Purser, (who volunteered his Services, and to whom I gave the Charge of the Quarter Deck Carronades in Mr. Yeo's Absence,) for the Precision and Coolness displayed by the Men under their Command in pointing the Guns, as well as the exact Attention paid to my Orders, and ceasing Fire the Instant the Union Jack made its Appearance on the Walls, by which, in all Probability, the Lives of several of our Men were saved. Mr. Cleverly, the Master, brought the Broadside to bear with much Quickness and Nicety, by Means of the Spring. I send you herewith a List of our Wounded on board, and on Shore, with One of the Enemy's Killed and Wounded; and an Account of their Force at the Commencement of the Action.

I have been under the Necessity of being more detailed than I could wish, but it is out of my Power, in a smaller Compass, to do Justice to the Exertions and Conduct of the Officers and Men employed on the different Services. It is but fair at the same Time to state that, much to the Credit of the Ship's Company, the Bishop and One of the principal Inhabitants of the Town came off to express their Gratitude for the orderly Behaviour of the People (there not being One Instance of Pillage,) and to make Offer of every Refreshment the Place affords.

I am now waiting for the Land Breeze to carry us out, having already recalled the Officers and Men from the Fort, the Guns being spiked and thrown over the Parapet, the Carriages rendered unserviceable, and the Embrazures, with Part of the Fort, blown up.

SIR,
I HAVE the Pleasure to acquaint you, that I proceeded on Shore with the Party you did me the Honor to place under my Command, for the Purpose of storming the Fort on the Point agreeable to your Orders, which, on our Approach, the Soldiers quitted. On my Arrival, I observed a strong Fort at the Entrance of the Town, opening a heavy Fire on the Ship; and, judging it practicable to carry it by Storm, from a thorough Knowledge I had of the determined Bravery of all the Officers and Men, I ordered them

to follow me for that Purpose, which was obeyed with all that Energy and Gallantry which British Seamen and Marines are so well known to possess on such an Occasion, and, in a very short Time, reached the Outer Gate, when the French Centinel fired, and retreated into the Fort, which we instantly entered, and was met by the Governor and all the Garrison, &c., when, after a dreadful Slaughter on the Part of the Enemy, the Remainder surrendered, and I instantly ordered the British Colours to be hoisted.

I feel it my Duty, as well as the greatest Pleasure, to mention the great Support I received from Lieutenant Mallock, of the Royal Marines, and Mr. Charles Clinch, Master's-Mate, as, from their being near me all the Time of the Action, I was enabled to observe their very cool and gallant Behaviour, as also of Lieutenant Douglas, of the Royal Marines, who, though engaged at different Parts of the Fort, I have no less Reason to be highly pleased with.

I must now beg Leave to say how much I am indebted to every Seaman and Marine of the Party, who behaved so unanimously brave nothing could withstand them, and to their Credit as Englishmen as well as their Profession; the Instant the Fort was in our Possession, they seemed to try who could be the first to relieve and assist the poor wounded Prisoners, who were lying in Numbers in different Parts of the Fort; and I had the Pleasure to see their Humanity amply repaid by the Gratitude the unfortunate Men's Friends expressed when they came to take them away.

Enemy's Force at the Commencement of the Action when opposed to His Majesty's Ship Loire, in Muros-Bay, the 4th of June 1805.

A Fort of 12 Spanish Eighteen-Pounders, mounted

on Travelling Carriages, 72 Spanish Soldiers, several Spanish Gentlemen and Townsmen Volunteers, and about 100 of the Confidence's Ship's Company.

The small Battery on the Point, 2 Spanish Eighteen-Pounders, one mounted as above, the other on a Ship Carriage, manned by 8 Artillery Men and 10 other Spaniards.

In the Bay.

La Confidence of Bourdeaux, pierced for 26 Guns, Twelves and Nines, (not on board,) 116 Feet long on the Main-Deck, 30 Feet wide, measures about 450 Tons, is in good Order, and a very fit Ship for His Majesty's Service; is reckoned to sail excessively fast; was to have gone to Sea in a few Days, bound to India, with a Complement of 300 Men: Brought away.

Le Belier, of Bourdeaux, pierced for 20 Guns; also fitting for Sea; was to have carried Eighteen-Pounder Carronades, and 180 Men; supposed to be destined to cruize to the Westward of Cape Clear: Burnt.

The Guns on the Fort and Battery spiked, and thrown over the Parapet. The Carriages broke, and rendered unserviceable. The Embrazures blown up. Forty Barrels of Powder brought on board, with Two small Brass Cannons, and 50 Stand of Arms.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honor to enclose, for their Lordships' Information, the Copy of a Letter from Captain Coghtan, of His Majesty's Sloop Renard, acquainting me of his having brought to Action the General Erneuf Privateer, late His Majesty's Sloop Lilly, which, after a close Action of Thirty-five Minutes, took Fire and exploded. It is an additional Proof of the steady and decisive Conduct of Captain Coghlan, who speaks in high Terms of his Officers and Ship's Company, all of whom will, I am sure, meet the Approbation of their Lordships.

His Majesty's Sloop Renard, Port Royal, Jamaica, April 27, 1805.

SIR,

HAVING escorted the Chesterfield Packet to the Latitude directed in your Order of the Sixteenth of March last, and being on my Way to carry into Effect the latter Part of it, I have the Honor to acquaint you, that at Eleven A. M. on Friday the Twentieth Ult. being in Latitude Twenty-one Deg. Fourteen Min. N., and Longitude Seventy-one Deg. Thirty Min. West, a Ship was seen to Leeward standing (under easy Sail) to the North West; all Sail was instantly made in Chace, and the Stranger soon discovered to be an Enemy, who, upon our Approach, shortened Sail, evidently with an Intention to engage us; at Twenty Minutes past Two P. M. having reduced our Sail, I closed with the Enemy, who opened his Fire upon us, but not a Gun was fired from this Ship until within Pistol-Shot, at which Distance she was placed on the Enemy's Weather-Bow, when, a Fire com-

menced that reflects infinite Praise on the Officers who directed it, for at the short Period of Thirty-five Minutes, the Enemy was discovered to be on Fire, and in Ten Minutes after blew up with a dreadful Explosion; every possible Exertion was now made to get the only Boat that could swim to the Relief of the few Brave, but unfortunate Survivors; who had just before so gallantly defended themselves, and who were now seen all around us, on the scattered Remnants of the Wreck, in a mangled and truly distressing State; but it is with Pleasure I add, that of the few who escaped the Flames, not a Man was drowned, amounting to Fifty-five.

The Ship proved to be the General Erneuf, a Privateer, late His Majesty's Sloop Lilly, commanded by Monsieur Paul Gerand Pointe, Seven Days from Basseterre, Guadaloupe, carrying Eighteen Twelve-Pounder Carronades, and Two long Guns (Four more than when in His Majesty's Service), with a Compliment of One Hundred and Sixty Men, (Thirty-one of whom were Soldiers,) going to Cruize for the Homeward bound Jamaica Fleet.

The Enemy's Loss was great before the melancholy Scene that put an End to the Action, having between Twenty and Thirty Men killed and wounded; and I am singularly happy to acquaint you that mine is inconsiderable, Nine Men only being wounded, some slightly, I hope none dangerously. The steady, cool, and determined Conduct of the Officers and Men serving under my Orders, was truly meritorious, and gives them just Claims on every Commendation that is in the Power of their Commander to bestow. Our Sails, Running, and Standing Rigging have suffered much, the Enemy's Fire being principally directed against them. The Second Captain and One Lieutenant are the only surviving Officers. This Ship cruized with great Success against the Trade of His Majesty's Subjects, having made Six valuable Captures on her former Cruize.

SIR,

I BEG Leave to inform you of the Capture of the French National Privateer Le Tape-a-bord, mounting Four Six-Pounders, well armed, and carrying Forty-six Men, commanded by Citizen Hemi-guelth, by the Boats of His Majesty's Ship under my Command, on the North Side of St. Domingo, Cape Francois, bearing S. W. by S. Distance Eight or Nine Leagues, on the Morning of the 6th In-



stant, a strange Sail was seen on the Larboard Bow, Distance Seven or Eight Miles, having then light Airs, and inclinable to calm, and perceiving the Stranger was using every Effort with his Sweeps to escape, and apparently full of Men, and no Hopes of my closing with His Majesty's Ship, I directed Henry Smith Wilson, First Lieutenant, with Four Boats, assisted by James Tait and Henry Bouchier, Second and Third Lieutenants, backed by the Volunteer Services of Thomas Tud, or Tucker, a Passenger belonging to His Majesty's Ship Northumberland, Walter Powell, Lieutenant of Marines, and Charles Rundle, Purser of His Majesty's Ship under my Command, to proceed with the Boats, and endeavour to come up with the Chace. The cool and determined Manner in which this Service was performed, after a Pull of many Hours, and the strong Opposition they met with, from the well-directed Fire of the Guns and Musketry, kept up by the Privateer, induces me thus publicly to express my Approbation of every Officer, Seaman, and Marine engaged on this Service; and I am happy to add, that no Lives were lost upon the Occasion.

This Privateer was from Samana, on a Cruise, out Ten Days, without taking any Thing.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5. George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS

for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Admistrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Judiciary or the Circuits there.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Judiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ire-

land; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and For-

feitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

And whereas the Table marked (B), above referred to, is in the Words following; viz. Table (B)
