

Every Deserter not actually serving in any of His Majesty's Regiments is to surrender himself for General Service.

Deserters serving in other Corps, (Militia, and Army of Reserve excepted,) are to continue therein upon declaring themselves to their respective Commanding Officers, who are to report the Circumstance to the Secretary at War and the Adjutant-General, and they shall not be liable at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly served: but this Clause is not to extend to Deserters enlisted by the Corps for raising Recruits for general Service, which Deserters are only to be entitled to their Pardon, on declaring themselves to be such, and will be transferred to such Regiments as His Majesty may be pleased to command.

The Magistrate to whom any Deserter from His Majesty's Regular Forces may surrender himself, is authorised and required to certify the Day on which such Deserter surrendered himself, which Certificate is to continue in force until the Arrival of the Deserter at the Head-Quarters of the nearest Military Post, provided he proceed at the Rate of Ten Miles a Day, unless prevented by Sickness, to be certified by some Medical Practitioner on the Back of the Magistrate's Certificate, or to be otherwise proved to the Satisfaction of the Officer commanding at such Military Post.

No Soldier who may desert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity. Nor shall any Soldier who surrendered himself upon any former Proclamation of His Majesty's Pardon, and who afterwards again deserted, be included in the above Pardon. And it is to be clearly understood, that this Pardon is not to extend to any Deserter from His Majesty's Militia Forces, or from the Army of Reserve, or Additional Force; but all Soldiers who shall have enlisted for general Service from the said Forces, and shall subsequently thereto have deserted, will be included in this His Majesty's gracious Pardon.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Copenhagen, September 3, 1805.

IN consequence of the Reports made by Adjutant-General Ovenern, the King has ordered the Erection of Lights, with reflecting Lamps, for the Direction of Navigators in the Baltic. Most of the Ships which navigate the Baltic having occasion to pass before Christiansoe, they run the Risk of being wrecked off that Place or the neighbouring Islands. To prevent these Misfortunes, and to point out the Course which Ships ought to take, it has been thought proper to erect on the Great Tower of Christiansoe a Light composed of Nine reflecting Lamps, the Circuit of which may be made in Three Minutes; so that, when the Nine large Lights are seen in the Distance, it requires about Twenty Seconds to pass from one to another. The Lights will disappear in the Intervals, but may always be seen, unless the Vessel be at too great a Distance. These Lights are to be placed at the Height of

Ninety-two Feet above the Level of the Sea. This Elevation has been adopted to prevent this Beacon from being mistaken for that which has stood for some Years at the Northern Point of the Isle of Bornholm, and in which the Light is made by a Coal Fire. This Light is Two Hundred and Seventy-two Feet above the Level of the Sea, and, in clear Weather, may be distinctly seen Five or Six Miles off at Sea. The Lights at Christiansoe will be displayed, for the first Time, on the 1st of October 1805, and will be kept up, conformable to the Ordonnance of the 21st of March 1705, and the Proclamation of 1st February 1799, that is to say, from Easter to Michaelmas, from one hour after sun-set to Sun-rise; and in Winter, from Half an Hour after Sun-set to Sun-rise.

WE, whose Names are hereunto subscribed, being Five of the Commissioners nominated and appointed in and by His Majesty's Commission, under the Great Seal of Great Britain, bearing Date at Westminster, the 19th Day of November 1804, for carrying into execution an Act of Parliament passed in the then last Session of Parliament, intitled "An Act to vest certain Messuages, Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments in Trustees for better securing His Majesty's Docks, Ships, and Stores, at Chatham, and for the Use of His Majesty's Ordnance at Warley and Woolwich;" do hereby give Notice, that the Commissioners for that Purpose appointed, or Five or more of them, do intend to meet on Tuesday the 29th Day of October instant, at the House called or known by the Name or Sign of the Crown, situate at Rochester, in the County of Kent, at Eleven of the Clock in the Forenoon of the same Day, for the Purpose of executing the said Commission according to the Powers and Authorities to the said Commissioners, or any Five or more of them, given by the said Act of Parliament, (so far as respects the Messuages, Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments hereinafter mentioned,) that is to say, All that Piece or Parcel of Fresh Marsh Land, containing, by Estimation, 5 Acres and 14 Poles, or thereabouts, (being the Easternmost Part of a certain Piece or Parcel of Fresh Marsh Land containing 15 Acres, 2 Roods, and 34 Poles,) and abutted and bounded as in the said Act mentioned; and also all that Messuage or Tenement, Stable, and other Buildings now standing and being on the said Piece or Parcel of Land lastly above-described; which said Piece or Parcel of Land, Messuage, or Tenement, Stable, and Buildings are situate in the Parish of Gillingham, in the County of Kent aforesaid, and are the Property of Elizabeth Stretch, Widow, and now in the Tenures or Occupations of George Nash and Munn Jewell, or their respective Assigns or Undertenants, (except and reserved unto the said Elizabeth Stretch, and the Owners and Occupiers for the Time being, of the Remainder of the Marsh Lands there belonging to the said Elizabeth Stretch, a Right of Way or Passage, with, or without Horses, Carts, Carriages, Cattle, or otherwise, to and from the Remainder of the said Marsh Lands over Spray Lane, and also over the said Piece or Parcel of Land above-described, and over and through a Bridge and
