Strachan, which confirms the wellfounded Expectation of the British Nation, in the uniform Success of its Naval Exertions.

That your Majefty may long live to witnefs the Profperity and Happinefs of a free and loyal People, is the Prayer of your Majefty's dutiful Subjects.
