Hague Feb. 18. The States of *Holland* continue their Assembly, but its believed they will separate towards the end of this week, and Adjourn till the 13th of the next Month. On Sunday last *Sir Gabriel Sylvius* and *Mr. Legg* departed from hence for the *Briel* to Embark thence for *England*. The Countess *de Soissons* is daily expected here from *Flanders*, she intending to go and see the *Italian Opera* at *Amsterdam*. The respective Admiralties have sent their Deputies hither, to represent to the States-General, that the Provinces of *Zea and Utrecht*, and *Overssessel* are full in great Arrears, as well on account of the Equipage made in the year 1675, for the *Mediterranean*, as that in 1676, for the *Baltick*. From *Germany* they write, that most of the lesser Princes upon the *Rhine* have been forced to obey the Summons of the Sovereign Chamber of *Metz or Brisac*, and to do Homage to the French King.

Paris, Feb. 15. The King has made a great change of the Governors in his Conquests in *Flanders*; *Monsieur Montbrun* who was Governor of *Tournay*, is removed to *Gambay*, &c. There are several Reports concerning the differences between this Crown and the Court of *Rome*, which deserve very little credit: when the Cardinal *d'Estree* is arrived at *Rome*, and has seen the Pope, we shall be able to make a better judgment of this Affair than now we can.

Edenburg, Feb. 1. The Lords of the Council have upon the Address of the Magistrates and Council of this City, and the Principal and Regents of the University, ordered the Colledge, which they had on occasion of some illegal Combinations and Misdemeanors of the Students, caused to be shut up, to be again opened, upon condition,

That the Magistrates before the re-entry of the Students or of any other for this year, take good Security for their orderly and peaceable Behaviour.

That before any Students of the three upper Classes be admitted, they take the Oath of Allegiance before the Bishop of *Edenburg*, which is not to hinder the taking the said Oath by such as take Degrees.

And if the Principal or Regents shall admit any of the said Students, or receive others, without the said Security, and their taking the said Oath of Allegiance, they shall be deprived of their Places, and others put into them.

That the said Students or others, when they take the said Oath of Allegiance, shall at the same time Sign an Engagement to keep the Church, and attend the Divine Worship, according to Law.

And it was further Ordered,

That there be a Visitation of the other Universities of this Kingdom, to see the Rules aforesaid put in execution.

And that the Masters of the said Universities be required not to receive any Students, who have left the Colledge on account of their refusing the said Oath and Engagement.

14 month, Feb. 7.
