THE following Addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honorable Earl Spencer, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The respectful, loyal, and dutiful Address of the Freehold Proprietors, and other Proprietors of Land, and the Clergy, of the County of Caithness, assembled at their County Meeting, by public Intimation from the Sheriff to that Effect.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, the Landholders and Clergy of the County of Caithness, assembled at a County Meeting, deeply impressed with Sentiments of Loyalty, Fidelity, and Respect for your Majesty's Person, Family, and Government, beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that while, with the deepest Concern, we contemplate the late disastrous Events, which have, in a Manner so rapid and extraordinary, led to the Defeat and Humiliation of the Austrian Power, and the consequent Distraction and Subjection of the different States on the Continent of Europe, we cannot refrain from offering to your Majesty our most heartfelt Congratulations on the late ever memorable Victories obtained by the British Fleet under the Command of the never to be forgotten Lord Nelson, (to whose Memory a Monument is erected in every true British Heart,) and several others of our Naval Heroes; Victories unequalled in the Annals of Naval History, and calculated, in their Consequences, to check the wild Ambition of the present Rulers of France; and to offer our warmest Approbation and sincerest Thanks to your Majesty, for calling to your Majesty's Councils the united Energy of Talents and of Genius, to protect all that is dear to Britons. Under such Auspices we look forward with Confidence for a System of Vigour, Vigilance, and Economy to support Public Affairs, preserve and strengthen National Security, and prove most conducive to the Honor and Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, and the Happiness and Liberty of your People.

In the Characters composing your Majesty's Councils we have perfect Confidence, that, under your Majesty's Direction, the National Strength will be augmented, its Resources improved and preserved, and the utmost Energies of a free, loyal, and united People will be called forth into Action, so that, with the Blessing of Divine Providence, this Country may keep fast its Liberties and Independ-

dence, and may maintain its due Rank among the Powers of Europe.

Permit us to assure your Majesty of our firm Cooperation in every Measure which may be deemed essential towards resisting any unreasonable Pretensions on the Part of your Majesty's Enemies; and for enabling your Majesty to restore to your People the Blessings of Peace on such Terms as may be consistent with the Honor, Dignity, and Safety of these Realms.

BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting certain Goods imported into Great Britain, to be secured in Warehouses without Payment of Duty:" It is, amongst other Things, enacted as follows: "That it shall be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Consignee or Consignees of any of the Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes enumerated or described in the Tables hereunto annexed, marked (D), and which shall be legally imported or brought into the Port of London, to lodge and secure the same under the Joint Locks of the Crown and the Merchant, in such Warehouse or Warehouses as may be fit and proper for the Reception and safe Custody of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, without Payment, at the Time of the first Entry, of the Duties of Customs due on the Importation thereof; provided it shall be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England, or any
