WHEREAS by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for granting to His Majesty during the present War, and for Six Months after the Expiration thereof by the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, additional Duties on certain Goods, Wares, and Merchandize imported into, and exported from, or brought or carried Coastwise within Great Britain;" the Lord High Treasurer, or the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, or any Three or more of them, are authorized to suspend certain Duties imposed by that Act upon the Importation of Sugar whenever it shall appear by Notice in the London Gazette, that the Average Price of Brown or Muscovado Sugar, taken in Manner directed by an Act passed in the Thirty-second Year of His present Majesty, in-

tituled "An Act for regulating the Allowance of the Drawback, and Payment of the Bounty on the Exportation of Sugar, and for permitting the Importation of Coffee and Sugar into the Bahama and Bermuda Islands in foreign Ships," for any of the Periods therein particularly mentioned shall be below Forty-seven Shillings the Hundred Weight, and such Suspension is thereby required to be published Three Times in the London Gazette.

In pursuance therefore of the Provisions of the said Act, we the undersigned, being Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, do hereby direct, that the Duties charged by the said Act upon Sugar imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, and sold at the public Sales of the said Company after the 10th May 1806, and the Duties charged upon Sugar imported into Great Britain after the 1st June 1806, not being Sugar imported by the said United Company, shall be, and the same is hereby suspended until the 1st Day of August next, unless in the mean Time we shall find it expedient to give any Notice to the contrary.—Whitehall, Treasury Chambers, the 17th Day of June 1806.
