P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Second Section of His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fifth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and five, certain Stations for the Performance of Quarantine by certain Ships and Vessels in the said Order specified, furnished with Clean Bills of Health, are assigned to such Ships and Vessels according to the Ports to which they are respectively bound; and Doubts have arisen at what Stations Quarantine ought to be performed by Ships and Vessels with Clean Bills of Health, captured or detained and brought into the Ports of Great Britain as Prize: His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to declare and order, that all such Ships and Vessels shall, for the Purpose of performing Quarantine, be deemed, and taken to be bound to the Ports into which they have been, or shall be so brought, and shall, together with all Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles on board thereof, perform Quarantine accordingly: And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the Rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors and Commanders in Chief, for the Time being of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to alter and amend an Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled An Act for rendering more commodious, and for better regulating, the Port of London, in far as the same relates to the Concerns of the West India Dock Company thereby established, and for extending to other Objects the Compensation directed to be made by the said Act;" it is (amongst other Things) enacted as follows:

"And be it further enacted, That when any one or more of the said Docks by the said recited Act, and this Act, authorized to be made and built by the said Directors, with the Basons or Basons, Quays, Wharfs, Warehouses, and other Works belonging, or to belong thereto, shall be so far completed, that, in the Judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or any Three or more of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, for the Time being, the same shall be fit for the Reception of Ships and Goods respectively, it shall be lawful for the said Lord High Treasurer, or any Three or more of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, for the Time being, and he and they are hereby respectively authorized and empowered, by Writing under his or their Hand or Hands, to certify and make known the same; which Certificate shall be published Three Times, at the least, in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers then usually circulated in London; and the said Certificate, so published as aforesaid, shall be deemed sufficient Notice to all Parties interested in the Completion of the Dock or Docks, Quays, Wharfs, Warehouses, and other Works, concerning which such Certificate of Approbation shall be made; and from and after the Expiration of Ten Days next ensuing the first Publication of the said Certificate, in Manner aforesaid, all the Rates and Duties by the said recited Act, and this Act, made payable to the said West India Dock Company, for Ships and Vessels entering into and using any of the said Docks, or any of the Basons and Cuts belonging, or which shall belong, thereto, and also for any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize which shall be landed or discharged from any Ship or Vessel lying within any of the said Docks, or any of the Basons or Cuts belonging, or which shall belong thereto, shall commence, take effect, and become payable; and then and from thenceforth such of the Quays and Wharfs then made or built by the said Company, as shall be described in such Certificate to be fit for the Reception of Goods, shall be deemed and taken to be legal Quays and Wharfs accordingly;

and all the Provisions in the said recited Act contained, relating to the Increase of Interest or Dividends from and after the Completion of the said Docks, Cuts, Quays, Wharfs, Warehouses, and other Works, and for compelling Ships and Vessels that shall arrive in the River Thames, with West India Produce on board, to unload and land the Whole of such Produce within some or one of the said Docks, or on the Quays or Wharfs belonging, or which shall belong thereto, and for causing the King's Duties in respect of the same to be ascertained at such Quays or Wharfs, and not elsewhere; and compelling such Ships and Vessels belonging to or frequenting the Port of London, as shall be used or employed in the West India Trade, to ship or take in their respective Cargoes, and be loaded either in some or one of the said Docks, or in such Part of the River Thames as shall be below the Entrance into the intended Canal at Blackwall aforesaid, shall take Effect, and be in full Force and Operation; and the said Term of Twenty-one Years, during which the aforesaid Provisions are to be in force, shall commence at and be computed from the Expiration of Ten Days from the Time of the first Publication of the said Certificate as before-mentioned; any Thing in the said recited Act contained to the contrary notwithstanding."

And whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have, in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, passed in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, by several Certificates under their Hands, declared that the following Works, made and erected by the West India Dock Company under the Authority of the said Acts, were so far completed, that the same were fit for the Reception of Ships and Goods; viz. The Two Entrance Basons, the Great Dock, and the Quays and Wharfs surrounding the same; also the several Warehouses erected upon the same Quays and Wharfs.

We the undersigned Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, do, in pursuance of the said Act passed in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, further certify and make known, that the following Works, made and erected by the said West India Dock Company under the Authority of the said Acts of Parliament, are so far completed, that, in our Judgment, the same are fit for the Reception of Ships and Goods respectively, viz.

The Export Dock, situate between the Import Dock and the Canal at the Isle of Dogs aforesaid, together with the Quays or Wharfs along the North Side of the said Export Dock, extending from the West End to the East End thereof.

CHELSEA HOSPITAL.

June 28, 1806.

THESE are, by Order of the Right Honorable the Lords and others, Commissioners for managing the Affairs of the Royal Hospital at Chelsea, to give Notice, That all Out Pensioners (as well Lettermen as others) belonging to the said Hospital, residing in London, or within Twenty-five

Miles thereof, are required to appear personally and regimentally at the Secretary's Office, in the said Hospital, on the respective Days undermentioned, when Attendance will be given from Nine o'Clock in the Morning until Three in the Afternoon; viz.,

On Wednesday, the 2d of July.

The Pensioners from the 1st and 2d Regiments of Life Guards, the late 1st and 2d Troops of Horse Guards, the late 1st and 2d Troops of Horse Grenadier Guards, the Royal Horse Guards (Blues), the Dragoon Guards, the 3d, 4th, and 7th Regiments of Horse, all the Dragoons and Fencible Cavalry, the British Legion of Horse, with the Waggon Train, also the Serjeants, Corporals, and private Men who receive the increased Pension of One Shilling and Sixpence; One Shilling and Two Pence, and One Shilling per Day, on account of Blindness.

On Thursday the 3d of July.

The Pensioners from the 1st, 2d, and 3d Regiments of Foot Guards.

On Friday, the 4th of July.

Those from the 1st to the 37th Regiments of Foot, inclusive.

And that all Out Pensioners (as well Lettermen as others) belonging to the said Hospital, who live at a greater Distance than Twenty-five Miles from London, and those in Scotland and Ireland, are hereby required and commanded, after the 25th of December next, and after every succeeding 25th of December, and 25th of June until further Orders, to apply to One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in the Neighbourhood where they reside, and make the following Affidavit, which the said Magistrate for the County, City, Borough, or Riding, before whom the Pensioner appears, will sign and date, viz.

The Affidavit, drawn according to the above Form, dated and attested by a Magistrate, is to be put in a Cover, and sent by the General Post, directed thus: “To the Right Hon. the Paymaster General, Horse Guards, London,” and mark in the Corner of the Cover, “Chelsea Pensioners’ Affidavits,” and Counterparts or Duplicates of the said Affidavits are to be referred by the Out Pensioners respectively, to be exhibited to such Persons as shall be directed to pay them, that they may be satisfied that all such as may claim Out Pensions are the real Persons entitled to receive the same.

And to the End that the Commissioners for the Affairs of Chelsea Hospital may be satisfied that the Pensioners are the same Persons who have passed their Examination, it is hereby further directed, that such of them who have served in, and have been discharged from, any of the Regiments or Independent Companies of Invalids, are not to mention in their Affidavits such Regiment or Company of Invalids in which they served last, but the Regiment, Troop or Corps of the Army from which they were first discharged and recommended, and received at Chelsea Hospital.

And as the General Payments in Great Britain and Ireland, at the End of the ensuing Six Months, are generally regulated by the Places of Residence mentioned by the Pensioners who are mustered at Chelsea in Person, and in the Body of the preceding Half-yearly Affidavits of those who live at a Distance, it is hereby ordered and directed, that no Person who shall change the Place of his Abode given in at his Muster, or specified in his Affidavit aforesaid, and who may apply for his Pension, (excepting to the Officers of Excise nearest such Place of Abode,) shall receive the same, unless it appears, by the Certificate of respectable Persons, that such Removal was through unavoidable Necessity, which he or they could not foresee or prevent; and that if any Pensioner shall fraudulently attempt to receive a double Payment of the Pension, either at Chelsea or at different Places, he shall be struck off the Lists.

Lastly, it is notified, that none will be entered upon the Pay Lists of the said Hospital, or be entitled to receive any Benefit therefrom, who shall not act agreeably to these Orders and Directions, particularly in sending their Half-Yearly Affidavits to the Paymaster-General, as above directed, and to no other Office; which several of the Pensioners have of late either neglected to do, or sent them irregularly to other Departments.

The Evening after the Murder was committed the said Richard Heming was seen at Tiberton, Warndon New Town, and Whittington, and is supposed to have with him Two Coats, the one long Blue Coat with White Metal Buttons, and the other a short Brown Coat;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the atrocious Murder above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them (except the Person who actually committed the said Murder,) who shall discover his or their accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
