

Notice is hereby given, pursuant to an Act of Parliament made in the 8th Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intitled, "An Act for the Amendment of the Law relating to Actions on the Statute of Hue and Cry," that Richard Tripe, of Dawlish, in the County of Devon, Yeoman and Shopkeeper, on Friday the 5th Day of this instant September, between the Hours of Ten and Eleven in the Forenoon of the same Day, as he was riding from Dawlish to Exeter on a low Poney, not exceeding Twelve Hands high, was stopped on Kenton Common, near the Cross-Road which leads to Mamhead and Starcross, in the Parish of Mamhead, within the Hundred of Exminster, in the said County, by a Person on Foot, who came close on the Left Side of the said Richard Tripe's Horse, and before he was perceived gave him the said Richard Tripe, with his Right Hand, a violent Blow at the Pit of his Stomach, which for the Moment deprived him of his Recollection; and knocked him back upon his Horse, when such Person took from the Side-Pocket of the said Richard Tripe his Pocket-Book, containing sundry Notes to the Amount or Value of 400l. 5s. and escaped therewith into the Plantations of Mamhead. The Person who committed this Robbery appeared to be disguised by a Piece of Black Crape or Cloth over his Face; and had on a dark coloured Snock Frock, and seemed to be about Five Feet Eight or Nine Inches high. The Bills consisted mostly of Notes of the Bank of England and of Country Banks, payable on Demand, except One Draft or Bill of Exchange for 30l. drawn by Colonel Chapman on Messrs. Ransom, Morland, and Company, London.
