on Wednesday next, the 3d of December, for His
late Most Serene Highness the Duke of Brunswick,
viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, plain Muslin or
long Lawn, Crape or Love Hoods, Black Silk
Shoes, Black glazed Gloves, and Black Paper Fans.
Undrefs—Black, or dark Grey, unwatered Tab-
bies.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Cloth Coats, with-
out Buttons on the Sleeves or Pockets, plain Muslin
or long Lawn Cravats and Weepers, Black Swords
and Buckles.

Undrefs—Dark Grey Frocks.

The Court to change the Mourning on Wednesday
the 31st of December, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, fringed or plain
Linen, White Gloves, Necklaces, and Ear-rings,
Black or White Shoes, Fans, and Tippets.
Undrefs—White or Grey Lutestrings, Tabbies,
or Damasks.

The Gentlemen to wear Black full-trimmed,
fringed or plain Linen, Black Swords and Buckles.
Undrefs—Grey Frocks.

The Court to change the Mourning further on
Wednesday the 7th of January 1807, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk or Velvet coloured
Ribbons, Fans, and Tippets; or plain White, or
White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuffs, with
Black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Coats, and Black
or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and
Silver Stuff Waistcoats, full-trimmed, coloured
Swords and Buckles.

And on Wednesday, the 14th of January, the
Court to go out of Mourning.
