A PROCLAMATION. GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by Our Order in Council, bearing Date the Twentieth Day of January last, the Time prescribed by Our several Proclamations now in force for the Payment of the Bounties promised by Our said Proclamations, for the Encouragement of Seamen and Landmen to enter into Our Royal Navy; and the Rewards for discovering Seamen who may conceal themselves, so that such Seamen should be taken for Our Service; and also the Rewards to Persons who should procure the voluntary Service of Able and Ordinary Seamen and Landmen, fit for Our Naval Service, and should convey such Seamen and Landmen on board of any of Our Ships and Vessels, or to any of Our Sea Officers employed in raising Men, has been continued until the Thirty-first Day of this instant December; which Bounties and Rewards are as follows; that is to say,—To every Able Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should enter himself to serve in Our Royal Navy, a Bounty of Five Pounds; and to every Ordinary Seaman, so entering himself, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, a Bounty of Three Pounds;—to every able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, so entering himself, a Bounty of Thirty Shillings;—to any Person or Persons who shall discover any Able or Ordinary Seaman or Seamen who may have concealed themselves, so that such Seaman may be taken for Our Service, by any of Our Officers employed to raise Men, a Reward of Three Pounds for every such Able Seaman, and Fifty Shillings for every such Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board Our Ships;—to any Person or Persons who shall procure the voluntary Service of Able or Ordinary Seamen or Landmen fit for Our Service, and shall convey them on board any of Our Ships or Vessels, or to any of Our Sea Officers employed in raising Men, a Reward of Four Guineas for every such Able Seaman, Three Guineas for every such Ordinary Seaman, and Two Guineas and a Half for every such Landman; together with an Allowance, at the Rate of One Penny

per Mile, for each Able Seaman, Ordinary Seaman, and Landman, for every Mile such Men may respectively travel to the nearest of Our Ships of War, or nearest Place of Residence of any of Our Sea Officers employed in raising Men; provided such Man shall be found fit for Our Service, and there shall not be Reason to suppose that he is an Apprentice:—And whereas it has been represented to Us, that it is expedient that the said several Bounties and Rewards should be continued until the Thirty-first Day of December, One thousand eight hundred and seven, save and except only that the Rewards to Persons who shall procure the voluntary Service of Able or Ordinary Seamen or Landmen fit for Our Naval Service, and shall convey them on board of any of Our Ships or Vessels, or to any of Our Sea Officers employed in raising Men, should be decreased, We have therefore, thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council to declare, and We do hereby declare, that, from and after the Thirty-first Day of December One thousand eight hundred and six, to, and until the Thirty-first Day of December One thousand eight hundred and seven, a Reward of Three Guineas, and no more, for every such Able Seaman; Two Guineas, and no more, for every such Ordinary Seaman; and One Guinea, and no more, for every such Landman, shall be paid to any Person who may procure the voluntary Service of any such Able Seaman, Ordinary Seaman, or Landman, together with the same Allowance for their travelling Expences, and with the same Provisos, as are specified in Our said Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Seventh Day of November, One thousand eight hundred and five:—And We do hereby, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, further promise and declare, that all other Bounties and Rewards granted by Our several Proclamations now in force, and declared by Our said Order in Council of the said Twentieth Day of January last to be continued to, and until the said Thirty-first Day of this instant December, One thousand eight hundred and six, for the Encouragement of Seamen and Landmen to enter into Our Royal Navy, and for the discovering of Seamen who may conceal themselves, shall continue to be paid in the Manner specified in Our said Proclamations respectively, to and until the Thirty-

first Day of December, One thousand eight hundred and seven.

Given at Our Court at the Queen's Palace, the Twenty-second Day of December, One thousand eight hundred and six, and in the Forty-seventh Year of Our Reign.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honour to inform you, His Majesty's Sloop under my Command fell in with and captured this Morning, after Four Hours Chace, the Spanish Schooner San Joseph y Animas Letter of Marque, from Truxello, bound to Batabano, laden with Indigo and Sarsaparilla, she also was charged with Dispatches which were landed previous to her Capture. She is armed with a long Eight-Pounder in Midships, and Fifteen small Arms, had only Thirteen Men when taken.

ENCLOSE you, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Copy of a Letter I have received from Captain Hall, of the Diligente, acquainting me of the Capture of the French Armed Schooner Napoleon.

His Majesty's Brig Diligente, Port Royal, October 24, 1806.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to inform you that, on the Morning of the 2d October, Cape Engana bearing North Seven Leagues, a Sail was discovered to Leeward, to whom we immediately gave chace, which was continued until Three A. M. on the following Morning, at which time, it being nearly Calm, I dispatched the Boats in chace, when after a pull of Two Hours they came up with, and captured her; she proves to be the French Armed Schooner La Napoleon, mounting One Brass long Nine-Pounder, with Fourteen Men and Passengers, bound to the City of St. Domingo, from Samana; where she was going to get a Letter of Marque, and her Complement of Men.

SIR,

I HAVE great Pleasure in transmitting to you, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Copy of a Letter I have received from Captain Nicholas, of the Drake, detailing the Particulars of a very gallant Action he witnessed by the Pitt Schooner, Lieutenant Fitton, with the French Schooner Privateer Superbe, the same Vessel that some Time since attempted to board the Peterell Sloop of War, off Charleston Bar, in which Affair Captain Maitland was unfortunately killed.

The Zeal and Perseverance manifested on this Occasion, during so long a Chace, (being upwards of Fifty Hours at their Sweeps, with only Two-Thirds the Number of Men the Privateer had) the very gallant Conduct, and superior professional Abilities displayed by Mr. Fitton, will, I trust, commend him to the Protection of their Lordships.

His Majesty's Sloop Drake, at Sea, 27th October 1806.

SIR,

I HAVE much Pleasure in reporting to you the Capture of the French Schooner Privateer La Superbe of Fourteen Guns (Two Nine-Pounders and Twelve Six-Pounders) and Ninety-four Men, commanded by M. Dominique Houx, by Lieutenant Fitton in His Majesty's Schooner Pitt.

This Officer meeting La Superbe off Cape Nicholas Mole on the 24th, after an arduous Chace with Sweeps, got within Gun Shot, and commenced a running Fight, which he continued with little Intermission, and in almost every Direction until the 26th, when at Nine A. M. Cape Maize bearing N. N. W. Six Leagues, they were discovered from the Tops of the Ship I command, and it was then that I witnessed with the greatest Satisfaction a display of Skill and Bravery supported for Four Hours and an Half, which entitles the Parties to the greatest Praise. The Two Schooners within Pistol Shot kept up a constant Fire. La Superbe seeing us to Leeward, made many Manœuvres to escape, but was as often foiled, Lieutenant Fitton carefully preserving the Weather Gage, and it was not until after a desperate Resistance, until she was in a sinking State, and when our fortunate Leeward Position prevented further flight, that the Frenchman ran his Vessel upon the Rocks in Ocoa Bay and deserted her, accompanied by those of his Men who were not either killed or dangerously wounded in the Action.

I cannot help repeating how much I am gratified in describing the Merits of this Affair, and in thus bearing Testimony to the Credit which Lieutenant Fitton, his Officers and Men have acquired, by the Style in which they fought and captured this notorious Robber.

In La Superbe's Hold were found Four Men already dead of their Wounds, and Three whose State affords little Hope; they allow that Fourteen fell in the Action, and from the Appearance of the Decks much Blood-must have been shed.

The Pitt has suffered in her Sails and Rigging, and had Two Men badly, and Six slightly wounded;



and I am happy to add that we succeeded in getting the Prize off.

SIR,

I HAVE the Satisfaction to inform you, this Day, the London Bridge Rock bearing S. E. Five or Six Leagues, I discovered a suspicious Vessel to the S. W. and after a Chace of Four Hours came up with, and captured the French Privateer Schooner La Desirée, having on board One Gun and twenty-four Men, out from Martinique Thirty-two Days, and had not taken any Thing.

SIR,

I HAVE the Satisfaction to acquaint you, that this Morning, the Island of Carriacou bearing East Four or Five Miles, I discovered a suspicious Vessel to the Southward, and, after a Chace of Five Hours, came up with, and captured the French Privateer Schooner La Marianne, with a Complement of Forty-six Men. She mounted One long Nine-pounder, in Midships, which was hove overboard in the Chace; out from Martinique Four Days.

I have great Satisfaction in the Capture of this Vessel, as she sails very fast, and has done some Damage to our Trade.
