Naples, Feb. 29.

Ince the arrival of the laft Courier from Spain, it has been the general difcourfe that the Duke of Albuquerque is to fucceed our prefent Viceroy in the Government of this Kingdom. There have been fome diforders at Trapani in Sicily, but fome evil minded perfons, who would be glad to fee that Kingdom involved in new troubles, have foread reports abroad concerning them, which have nothing at all of truth.

Warfaw, Feb. 28. The Molcovite Ambaffadors, which we have expected with to much impatience are at last arrived; and this day they made their publick Entry, and within a day or two will have their Audience of the King and the Dyct; It is in the mean time faid that these Ambassadors come empowered to make fuch overtures, as will be very acceptable to this Republick, and therefore its not doubted but a r folution will be taken to joyne with the Czar of Moleovy in a War against the Turks, which the Popes Nuncio and the Emperors Ambaffador are not wanting to do what lyes in them to promote; The Dy t which was upon breaking up, the fix weeks which is the Term of their Seffion being ready to expire, is prolonged for eight days, which will be chiefly employed in hearing the Propofalls of the faid Ambaffadors, and taking fiting Refolutions upon them.

Rome, March I. On Sunday last arrived here an Express from France; and the next day the French Ambassiador wrote to the several Cardinals that are here, except the Cardinals Cibo, Ottoboni, Carpegna, and Azzolino, to acquaint them with the reatons that have induced the King his Maßer to revoke the Decree made in the Reign of Henry the IV. concerning the Regalivy, and to proceed as he has done in this Affair. The Cardinal d' Estree has likewife defined another Audience of the Pope, and its faid that if his Eminence find in him no disposition to an Accommodation, he will part from he ice to Turin, and that his Brother the Duke d' Estree will not continue here long after hum.

continue here long after hun. *Penice, March* 8. The Dake of *Hanouer* parted from hence, on Sunday laft, but in his journey was taken with a Cholick, upon notice of which Phifitians were fent to him from hence, and we fince underfland that he is pretty well again, and in a condition to continue his journey. The Duke of *Mantona*, is gone home, and the *Abbée Morel* the French Envoye did not flay here many days after, but followed his Highnefs to *Mantoua*. The matter of the

Regality and the differences that have thereupon arilen between the Court of France and Rome, afford an ample fubject of difcourfe, which the generality of people here at prefent entertain themfelves with, looking upon it as a thing that may, if it be not accommodated, have great confequences, and may even be an occafion of diffurbing the Peace of Italy; two days fince arrived here the Cardinal Barbarigo.

Vienna, March 9. The Duke of Lorrain will part hence the next week with his Wife the Queen of Poland for Lintz, to meet their Imperial Majeflies there, at their return from Oetingen, and from thence will continue their journey to Infprucks. Yefferday arrived here an Extraordinary Courier from Conftantinople, the Letters he brought were prefently fent forward to Lintz, being as the report goes of great concernment, which fays, that there was great appearance of a Peace between the Mofcovites and the Turks, and that the true de4 figns of the latter were upon Hungary.

figns of the latter were upon Hungary. Berlin, March 8. Yefterday our Elector went hence to Francford on the Oder ten German Leagues from hence, where he will convinue during the Fair which begins there the tenth Inflant. The day is fet for the Sale of the Geods taken on Board the Spanish ship, and the Sieur Roule chief director of the Maritine Affairs will part from hence in few days for the Pillaw to give the neceffary orders in this matter, as also for the fitting out the faid Spanish ship to reinforce the Squadron, which our Elector has fent to the Weft Indies: There is a report as if they had taken two or three prizes; the Plague being wholy cealed at Drelden and Leipzicke, the Merchants return to their Trade, which will in a fhort tim- be reflored to it's former State.

Berlin, March 11. Our Letters from Warfaw advife us of the arrival of the Moscovite Ambailadors; that thereupon the Dyet was prolonged to the 8th of this Month; on the second the faid Ambaffadors were to have their Audience; If the Proposalls they make be acceptable to the Dyet, it is generally believed they will resolve to enter into an actual War against the Turks.

Strasburg, March 10. We talk much of the Conferences that are to be held between the Imperial and French Commissioners, though no body expects any great matrers from them. The Leavies that are making for his Imperial Ma effy at. Nureuberg, Augsbourg, and Francford, go on very well; and from the last of those places they write that feveral Imperial Troops were on their march to reinforce the Garrison of Philipsburg.

Lintz, March 11. The fourth Inflant their Imperial Majeflies parted from hence for Getingen, from whence they will return on the 14 and on the

the 20 the Court removes to Vienna. From Hungary they write that the Turks are providing great Magazines in the Frontier places, and that thefe and other the preparations they make on that fide, give a just ground to believe that they do not intend to employ the great Armics they will have in the Field this Summer onely against the Moscovites, but that they rather defig i to fall upon Hungary, where probably they propole to them(elves their Armes will meet with lefs opposition; and if the reports that are abroad of the Molcovites bling upon making a Peace with the Turks be true, we have to much the more reason to be allarmed at these advices from Hungary, when things are at prefent pretty quiet; the Imperial Troops as well as those of the Malcontents remaining in their quarters, and will do fo till the meeting of the Dyet, which its hoped will remove the occasions of their coming into the Fi ld again.

Cologne. March 18. Our Elector having in vain endeavored by all fair means to make the City of Liege lenfible of their late undutiful carriage, and to bring them back to their ob-dience, feems now refolved to make use of fuch other ways as may prove more effectual; and to that end has ordered feveral Troops to march towards the Meufe, and we are told they are to joyne with other Forces, and that together they will make fuch a Body, as may when it appears before the City of Liege, have fome influence upon the generality of the people. The laft Letters from the Emperors Court spoke of fresh fears they were in, that the great preparations which the Grand Signior is now making are defigned against Hungary, which contradicts the news we have from Poland of that Crowns being about entring into Engagements with the Molcovites for the carrying on the War against the Turks; And this last deferves the most credit.

Hamburg, March 18. The differences between the King of Spain and the Elector of Brandenburg cannot yet be compoled; and therefor his Electoral Highne's feems politively r folved to difpole of the goods taken in the Spanish Ship called Charles the second; and the last Letters from Berlin fay, that he had given Orders for the fitting cut the faid Ship, to ferve as a Man of War in his fervice. The King of Danemark, 2s we are informed will be at Gluckfladt before the enl of this Month, and will continue fome time in thefe parts. We cannot yet fpeak with certainty of the Interview which its faid is defigued to be between him and the Elector of Brandenburg.

Bruffels, March >1. The behavior of the Commons of the S City having for fome time pall been fuch as to create a great difpleature in our King againfl them, we have within thefe few days feen the effect of it, for yelterday our Governor the Prince of Parma (to whom the Nations gave fome days fince a frefh offerce by their not complying with his Highnefs, who asked of them the 2 oth Penny upon the Rents of Houfes which had been demanded by the Duke ds *Villa Hermola*, before he left this Goverament) cufed publick notice to be given of his Reforming, in purfurance of the Orders he has received from Spain, wholy to leave this City and to go and refide at Malines, and that the feveral

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Councils and Courts of Indicature should within ten days remove from hence; the Council of Brabant, with the Councellers, Greffiers, Advocates and Procurators, and all other perfons any way depend ng upon it being appointed to go to Louvain; the Chamber of Accounts to Vi. word, and the Council of State, the Finances, the Foedal and Privy Council to Malires, where the Prince of Parma intends to be before the end of this Mo th; the Guard of Archers and F &' bardiers having an eady received orders to march thither, and above 1000 Families will remove from hence with the Court. The French Troops commanded by Menfieur de Biffy continue in the Province of Luxemburg; we are told that they live very orderly, and pay for what they have, but we fear they will not long do fo. Yefterday Monficur Costelmo parted from hence for Paris, to complain of this manner of proceeding; And this morning the Baron d' Heftel for Germany: He gues first to the Princes on the Rbine, and then to the Electors of Brandenburg, Saxony, &c. An Express has been likewife fent to the Marquis de Bourgomanero, our Kings Ambaflador at the Emperors Court, and Monficur Agurto is gone to the Hague.

Paris, March 22. The 20 Inflant dyed Louis Di ke de Betbune Pair of France, in the 77 year (f his Age. The King holds his refolution as we are informed, of going to Bourbone, the Dauphin beirg advifed to use those Waters; and while the Court is there, Monsteur de Louvois will take a journey to Lorraine and A'face, to view the Fortifications that are making on that fice. As to our Affairs with Rome, they continue in the fame flate as formerly, the Cardinal d' Estree not having as yet been able to bring them to an accommodation.

Plimouth, March 15. This morning His Majeflies Ship the swallow, Sailed from hence for Portsmouth. Portsmouth, March 17. The Swallow Frigate is arrived here from Plimouth.
