The King has been pleased, by an especial Warrant under His Royal Signet and Sign Manual, to grant unto Sir George Nugent, of Waddesdon, in the County of Buckingham, Baronet, Lieutenant-General in the Army, and one of the Representatives in Parliament for the Borough of Aylesbury, in the aforesaid County of Buckingham, His Royal Licence and Authority, that he, and the Heirs Male of his Body, to whom the Dignity of Baronet shall descend by virtue of the Limitations in the Letters Patent of Creation, may bear Supporters to his and their Arms; the same being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Herald's-Office, otherwise to be void and of none Effect:

And also to command, that this His Majesty's Concession, and especial Mark of His Royal Favour, be registered in His College of Arms.

#### INVENTION OF PAPER-MAKING BY MACHINERY.

Notice, pursuant to Leave granted by the Honourable House of Commons.

Notice is hereby given, that Henry Fourdrinier and Sealy Fourdrinier, of Sherborne-Lane, in the City of London, Paper-Manufacturers, and John Gamble, of St Neott's, in the County of Huntingdon, Paper Manufacturer, are now making Application to Parliament for Leave to bring in a Bill for prolonging the Term of certain Letters Patent hereinafter-mentioned, in relation to the Inventions hereinafter also mentioned, by extending the Privileges granted by the said Letters Patent, and for vesting the same in the said Petitioners, their Executors, Administrators, and Assigns, for a further Term of Years:—And the following Statement, containing a distinct Description of the Inventions for which the said Letters Patent respectively were obtained, and also an Account of the Term of their Duration respectively, that is to say; the said John Gamble obtained a Grant of His Majesty's Letters Patent, dated on or about the 20th Day of April 1801, for the exclusive Use in England, Wales, and the Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, of a Machine for making Paper in single Sheets without Seam or Joinings, from One to Twelve Feet and upwards wide, and from One to Forty-five Feet and upwards in Length; and the said John Gamble afterwards obtained other Letters Patent, dated on or about the 22d Day of July 1801, for the Use of the same Machine in Ireland; and other Letters Patent, dated on or about the 20th Day of January 1802, for the Use thereof in Scotland; all which Grants were for the Term of Fourteen Years from the respective Dates thereof; and the said John Gamble obtained other Letters Patent for certain Improvements on, and Additions to, the above-described Machine; namely, as to Eng-

land, Wales, and the Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, on or about the 7th Day of June 1803; as to Scotland, on or about the 21st Day of October 1803; and as to Ireland, on or about the 13th Day of February 1804; which said several last-mentioned Grants were for the Term of Fourteen Years from the respective Dates thereof.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to His Majesty, that on the Evening of the 7th Instant, the Boats of the Tartar Cutter, in the Service of His Majesty's Customs, and of the Lively Cutter, in the Service of His Majesty's Excise, were feloniously fired on by the Crew of a Smuggling Luger, with the Name obliterated, then lying in Folkstone Roads, which was afterwards seized by the Revenue Officers, and her Crew, consisting of Fourteen Men, taken out of her, and put on board the said Cutters, Seven of whom afterwards escaped from the Tartar, and Three were rescued from the Custody of the Peace Officers in the Town of Dover;

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said Offenders who have escaped, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them (except the Master of the said Luger, and such of her Crew as actually fired,) who will discover any one or more of the said Offenders who have escaped, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence.

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And, as a further Encouragement, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs do hereby offer a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons, (except as is before excepted,) who will make such Discovery as aforesaid, such Reward to be paid upon Conviction of such Offender or Offenders by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to His Majesty, that on the Evening of the 8th Instant, a very numerous Mob assembled in the Town of Dover for the Purpose of rescuing from the Custody of the Peace Officers several Smugglers, who stood charged with Felony; and that although Proclamation was made by the Mayor of the said Town for the Persons assembled to disperse themselves, and peaceably depart to their Habitations, or to their lawful Business, upon the Pains contained in the Act made in the First Year of the Reign of King George the First, for preventing Tumults and Riotous Assemblies, yet the said Mob, consisting of several Hundred Persons, did not disperse till the Arrival of a large Party of Cavalry and Infantry, about Two Hours after the said Proclamation, and succeeded in rescuing Three of the said Smugglers, and severely assaulted an Officer and a Private of the Shropshire Militia, and an Officer of the Royal Miners;

His Majesty, for better discovering and bringing to Justice the principal Persons engaged in the said Riot, and who, by not dispersing according to the said Proclamation, have committed Felony within the said Act, is pleased hereby to offer His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of the said Rioters, (except those who actually committed Acts of Violence,) who will discover
