AT the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 8th of April 1807,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Count Melville, the Right Honourable Henry Vifcount Melville, the Right Honourable John Lord Teignmouth, and the Right Honourable Major-General Sir Arthur Wellesley, K. B. were, by His Majetty's Command, sworn of His Majetty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

Westminster, April 9, 1807.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Meffage was fent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorifed by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Ass agreed upon by both House, do descre the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to rectify a Mistake in an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament, for enabling His Maijesty to settle Annuities on certain Branches of the

Royal Family.

An Act to amend feveral Acts for regulating and fecuring the Collection of the Duties on Paper made in Ireland; and to make perpetual fo much of an Act, made in the Forty-fifth Year of His prefent Majesty, as relates to Paper Hangings printed or stained in Ireland.

An Act for further regulating and converting the Statute Labour in the County of Fife; and for more effectually making and repairing the Highways, Bridges, and Ferries within the faid County.

An Act to alter, amend, and enlarge the Powers of an Act, passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of His

late Majesty, for the more easy and speedy Recovery of small Debts within the Town of Birmingham, and Hamlet of Deritend thereto adjoining, in the County of Warwick.

An Act for enlarging the Church-Yard belonging to the Parish of Saint Martin, in the Town of Birmingham, in the County of Warwick, and for providing an additional Cemetery or Burial Ground for

the Use of the said Parish.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of Two Acts, paffed in the Thirtieth and Thirty-seventh Years of His present Majesty, for making and repairing certain Roads in the County of Fife; and for making and keeping in Repair several other Roads in the faid County.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of Two Acts, paffed in the Fifth and Fifteenth Years of His prefent Majetly, for repairing and widening the Road leading from Porthaethwy Ferry to Holyhead, in the County

of Anglesey.

An Act for regulating and converting the Statute Labour in the Counties of Rofs and Cromarty, and that Part of the County of Nairn which is locally fituated in the County of Rofs; and for more effectually making and repairing the Roads and Bridges within the fame; and for making and maintaining the Great Post Road from the Confines of Inverness-shire to the Confines of the Shire of Sutherland.

And Seven Private Acts,

Whitehall, April 11, 1807.

The King has been pleafed to order a Writ to be iffued under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for fummoning the Right Honourable Charles William Montagu Scott, (commonly called Earl of Dalkeith,) up to the House of Peers, by the Stile and Title of Baron Tynedale, of Tynedale, in the County of Northumberland.

The King has also been pleased to order a Writ to be issued under the Great Scal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for summoning the Right Honourable George Gordon, (commonly called Marquis of Huntley,) up to the House of Peers, by the Style and Title of Baron Gordon,

of Huntley, in the County of Gloucester.
