“ That the Right of voting for Members to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Saltash, is in the Mayor and Free Burgesses of the Borough of Saltash, being Members of the Corporation within the same, and in no other Persons:

' That the Right of voting for Members to serve in Parliament at Rochester, is in all Freemen not receiving Alms or Charity: '

Mr. Gilbert, the Proctors; Mr. Beverley and Mr. Gunning, Esquire Bedells; and accompanied by the following Noblemen and Gentlemen: His Highness the Duke of Gloucester; the Earl of Euston, and the Right Honourable Lord Henry Petty, Representatives in Parliament for the University; the Marquis of Huntley, Lord Viscount Castlereagh, Lord Manners, the Right Honourable Spencer Perceval; Doctor Sumner, Provost of King's College; Doctor Turner, Master of Pembroke College; Doctor Craven, Master of St. John's College; Doctor Milner, Master of Queen's College; Doctor Douglas, Master of Benet College; Doctor Mansel, Master of Trinity College; and the Reverend F. T. H. Wolleston, Master of Sidney College.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Chancellor, Masters,
and Scholars of the University of Cambridge.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of your University of Cambridge, humbly beg Leave to offer to your Majesty our warmest Thanks for the conscientious Regard, and the inflexible Firmness with which you have uniformly supported the Protestant Religion established in your united Kingdom. Your Majesty's University of Cambridge has always been forward in favouring religious Toleration amongst all Sects of Christians, but we are at the same Time fully sensible of the Distinction to be made between Toleration and the granting of Power.

We are anxious therefore, more particularly at this Time, to express how much we feel, and how highly we value your Majesty's Protection of our purer Church, and your Resistance not only to Bigotry, but to Indifference in Religion. We admire your Majesty's Constancy in discountenancing and withstanding every Attempt to break down the Barriers which the Wisdom of our Ancestors has erected for the Maintenance of our Establishment, and the Security of our Constitution.

It is indeed at all Times our Duty to inculcate true Christian and Protestant Principles into the Youth entrusted to our Care, but we have seldom had so favourable an Opportunity of impressing those Principles on their Minds, as that which has been now afforded us by your Majesty's most gracious example.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:

I THANK you for your loyal and dutiful Address.

Your unvaried Attachment to My Person and Government, and your constant Endeavours to inculcate true Christian and Protestant Principles into the Youth entrusted to your Care, demand My warmest Acknowledgments. The beneficial Effects of such Conduct are most sensibly felt in every Part of My Dominions, by the Encouragement which it holds out to true Religion and Piety, and by the Security which it affords to the civil and religious Establishments of the Country.

WE, the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Commonalty of the City of Winchester, beg Leave to assure your Gracious Majesty, that we embrace with eager Satis-

saction every Occasion to renew to your Majesty a Pledge of our most sincere, devoted, and undeviating Duty and Affection: And we presume to offer, at the Foot of your Throne, our Expressions of the deepest Gratitude for the numerous Instances of Attachment to the civil and ecclesiastical Interests of your People, by which the Reign of your Majesty has been uniformly and eminently distinguished. We are unable to express the Sense which we feel of your Majesty's paternal Regard and Solicitudude for the dearest Rights of your Protestant Subjects, so unequivocally displayed on a late Occasion, by your firm and constitutional Resistance to Measures of farther Concession to the Roman Catholics of Ireland, whose Claims, we are fully persuaded, could not be acceded to without endangering the Interests of the established Church; or consistently with those Principles which seated, and which we trust, under the Blessing of divine Providence, will long continue to maintain the Family of your Majesty on the Throne of these Kingdoms.

We feel as forcibly as any Body of your Majesty's Subjects, that wise, liberal, and enlightened Policy which secures to every Individual in your extensive Empire the free exercise of his religious Opinions; but we cannot, without serious Apprehension, contemplate the Introduction of any System calculated ultimately to remove the Barriers which the Wisdom and Experience of our Ancestors thought essential to the Security of the Protestant Church, and the permanent Prosperity of our civil Constitution.

That your Majesty may long continue the firm and conscientious Guardian of our present Establishments both in Church and State, to which we are persuaded, is principally to be ascribed the numerous Blessings we enjoy, is the most sincere and anxious Prayer of your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Commonalty of this ancient and respectable City. *J. the Regulations and Directions in the said Act contained; and the said Lord High Treasurer, or Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, were thereby authorized and empowered, by Writing under his or their Hand or Hands, to certify and make known his or their Approbation of such Warehouses, which Certificate should be published Three Times at least, in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers usually circulated in London.

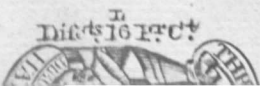
