cil Chamber. The Council fitting, His Grace's Commission was read, and the Oath being adminiftered to him, His Grace was invested with the Collar of the most illustrious Order of Saint Patrick, and received the Sword of State from the Duke of Bed-His Grace afterwards repaired to the Prefence Chamber, and received the Compliments of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, upon his fafe Arrival, and taking upon him the Government of Ireland.

Dublin-Castle, April 21, 1807. THIS Day at Four o'Clock, His Grace the Duke of Bedford, late Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, left the Cattle in order to embark on board His Majesty's Yacht the Dorset, on his Return to Eng-

His Grace the Duke of Richmond, Lord Lieutenant, and the Duke of Bedford, went together from the Castle in the State Coach, preceded by the leading Coaches, in which were the Officers of State, to the South Wall, where the Yacht lay. They were escorted by a Squadron of Dragoons, and attended by a great Number of the Nobility and Per-fons of Distinction; the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, several of the Aldermen and principal Citizens, in their Carriages, followed by a Concourfe of People, to the Water-fide: the Streets were lined by the Regiments of Infantry on Dublin Duty. The Duke of Bedford received every Demonstration of Re-spect, in passing through the Streets, from the People, who testified their Regard by repeated Wishes for his Welfare and safe Return to England.

LONDON DOCKS. BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-third VV Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for permitting certain Goods imported "into Great Britain to be secured in Warehouses, without Payment of Duty," it is enacted, That it should be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Confignee or Confignees of any of the Goods, Wares, or Mer-chandize enumerated or described in the Table thereunto annexed, marked (B), and which shall be legally imported and brought into the Port of London, to lodge and fecure the fame under the Joint Locks of the Crown and the London Dock Company, in any Warehouse or Warehouses erected or to be erected, fituate within the Premises belonging to the London Dock Company, without Payment at the Time of the first Entry of fuch Goods, Wares, and Merchandize of the Duties of Customs or Excise due on the Importation thereof, Subject nevertheless, to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions therein contained; provided that no fuch Goods, Wares, or Merchandize should be so lodged or secured unless, and until such Warehouses or other Works belonging, or to belong thereto, should be so far completed, that in the Judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, the same shall be fit and proper, in every Respect, for the Reception of fuch Goods, Wares, and Mer-

chandize, and wherein the fame might respectively be fafely and fecurely deposited, and remain under the Regulations and Directions in the faid Act contained; and the faid Lord High Treasurer, or Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, were thereby authorized and empowered, by Writing under his or their Hand or Hands, to certify and make known his or their Approbation of fuch Warehouses, which Certificate should be published Three Times at least, in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers usually circulated in London
