A PROCLAMATION,

For diffolving the prefent Parliament, and declaring the Calling of another.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We think fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to diffolve this present Presiament, which stands prorogued to Wednefday the Thirteenth Day of May next: We do therefore publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby diffolve the faid Parliament accordingly; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeffes, and the Commiffioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on the faid Wednesday, the Thirteenth Day of May next. And We being defirous and refolved, as foon as may be, to meet Our People, and to have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving Subjects Our Royal Will and Pleasure to call a new Parliament: And do hereby further declare, that, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, We have this Day given Order that Our Chancellor of that Part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, and Our Chancellor of Ireland, do respectively forthwith iffue out Writs in due Form, and according to Law, for calling a new Parliament. And We do hereby also, by this Our Royal Proclamation under Our Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, require Writs forthwith to be iffued accordingly by Our faid Chancellors refpectively, for caufing the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, who are to serve in the said Parliament, to be duly returned to, and give their Attendance in, Our faid Parliament; which Writs are to be returnable on Monday the Twenty-fecond Day of June next.

A PROCLAMATION,

In order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen

Peers of Scotland.

GEORGE R.

7 HEREAS We have, in Our Council, thought fit to declare Our Pleasure for summoning and holding a Parliament of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on Monday the Twenty-second Day of June next ensuing the Date hereof: In order therefore to the electing and fummoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to ht in the House of Peers in the faid Parliament; We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, iffue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to affemble and meet at Holy Rood-House, in Edinburgh, on Tuesday the Ninth Day of June next enfuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers to fit and vote in the House of Peers, in the faid enfuing Parliament, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be abfent, (fuch Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly figned before Witneffes, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law). And the Lord Clerk Register, or fuch Two of the Principal Clerks of the Seifion as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name. are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the faid Peers, and to take their Votes; and immediately after fuch Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Sixteen Peers so elected, and fign and attest the same, in the Presence of the said Peers the Electors; and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Proclamation, flrictly command and require the Provoft of Edinburgh, and

all other the Magistrates of the faid City, to take ! especial Care to preserve the Peace thereof, during the Time of the faid Election; and to prevent all Manner of Riots, Tumults, Diforders, and Violence whatfoever. And We strictly charge and command, that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twentyfive Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the faid Peers to proceed to fuch

Witness Ourself at Westminster, the Twentyninth Day of April, One thousand eight hundred and feven, in the Forty feventh Year of our Reign.

WHEREAS, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majelty by an Act, passed in the last Seffion of Parliament, intituled " An Act for revivingand continuing feveral Laws of Customs relating to the establishing Courts of Judicature in the Island of Newfoundland; and to the prohibiting the Expor-Great Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provinion without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and nine; and for continuing feveral Laws relating to the granting a Bounty upon certain Species of British and Irish Linens exported from Great Britain, and taking off the Duties on Importation into Great Britain of Foreign Raw Linen Yarns made of Flax; to the granting a Bounty upon the Importation into Great Britain of Hemp, and rough and undressed Flax, from His Majesty's Colonies in America, and to the Encouragement of the Greenland Whale Fisheries; and for reviving and continuing feveral Laws relating to the regulating the Prices at which Corn and Grain may be exported from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain; and to the Admission to Entry in Great Britain of Oil and Blubber of Newfoundland, taken by His Majefly's Subjects carrying on the Fishery from, and residing in, the faid Island; and for continuing an A& of the Twenty-third Year of His prefent Majesty, for the more effectual Encouragement of the Manufactures of Flax and Cotton in Great Britain; and for reviving and continuing feveral Laws relating to the permitting the Importation into Great Britain of Hides and other Articles in Foreign Ships; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, or other Provisions, and to the permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions, without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eight; and for reviving and continuing an Act, passed in the Parliament of Ireland in the Twenty-fifth Year of His present Majesty, for the Encouragement of the Flaxen and Hempen Manufactures of Ireland until the Twenty-fifth Day | [Transmitted by His Grace the Duke of Marlborough.]

of March One thousand eight hundred and twentyfeven; and for amending and further continuing an Act made in the Seventh Year of His present Majesty for the free Importation into Great Britain of Cochineal and Indigo, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and nine:"

His Majelly was pleafed by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Eighth Day of October last, to permit for the Space of Six Months, from the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of October, the Importation of fundry Articles of Pro-visions, therein specified, Duty fee: And whereas it is judged, expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Sixteenth of this inflant April the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans, called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sous of Pulse; and also of Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, and of Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, (except Salted Beef, and Pork.) and of Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheefe, Poratoes, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His prefent Majelly; and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
