That the tried Friends of Religion and of rational Liberty, to whom you have committed the Management of the public Interests, may ever share your Majesty's Councils; and that the Divine Mercy may long preserve a Sovereign whom so many Benefits endear to us, are the earnest Wishes of your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Magistrates and Council of the Royal Burgh of Renfrew.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Merchants, Ship Owners, and other Inhabitants of the Port of Bridlington, in the County of York, approach your Royal Throne, impressed with Sentiments of the deepest Gratitude and Affection to your Majesty's Person, and especially for your Majesty's constant and anxious Solicitude and Regard to maintain unimpaired the Constitution of these Realms in Church and State.

We beg Leave most humbly to express to your Majesty our sincere Thanks for that paternal Care and Wisdom which, in the Exercise of your Royal Prerogative, hath lately called to your Majesty's

Councils Persons of the highest Consideration for Integrity and Talents; who, from their well known Attachment to the Rights of your Majesty's Crown, and to the Privileges of the People; from their former uniform Attention to the Commercial Interests of the Empire, and from their recent Exertions to maintain the Navigation and Colonial System of the Country, and to support the belligerent Rights of the Nation, we venture to express our Confidence that our national Securities will be strengthened and preserved in a vigorous Resistance to the Enemy; that your Majesty's Arms by Sea and Land will be so well directed, as ultimately to procure to your Majesty and the Nation a safe, honourable, and lasting Peace. And we most humbly implore that beneficent Providence, which has hitherto protected your Majesty's Person and illustrious Family from all Machinations, foreign and domestic, to continue to your Majesty the Blessing of Health, and Happiness for many Years to come.
