The humble Address of the undersigned Inhabitants of the Town of Falmouth, in the County of Cornwall.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful Subjects, the undersigned Inhabitants of your Majesty's loyal Town of Falmouth, in the County of Cornwall, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with our most grateful Thanks for the renewed Instance your Majesty has recently given of your firm Determination to maintain the Ascendancy of the Protestant Religion in these Realms, as by Law established.

History has taught us, that to the Ascendancy of that Religion we are indebted, under God, for all the Liberty and Freedom we enjoy, as well as for that high Situation we hold amongst the Nations, whereby we are enabled to successfully withstand that destructive Flood, which has nearly swept away all the ancient Establishments of Europe. History has further taught us, that from the Period of the glorious Revolution, which entwined the Protestant

Religion around the Constitution, and around your Majesty's sacred Family, binding them inseparably together for ever, England has been constantly increasing in Wealth and Power, whilst Knowledge, Science, internal Peace, and Happiness, have been equally progressive.
