THE following Addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkesbury, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

TO permit your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Citizens of the City of Chichester, to express the grateful Sense they entertain of your Majesty's truly paternal Consideration for the Welfare of these Realms, in dismissing from your Service Ministers who could presume to agitate a Question which involved and endangered the Safety of our religious Establishment, and which had for its Object a Re-

laxation of those wholesome Laws, which have for a Series of Years confined Toleration within just and proper Bounds.

We are at a Loss which most to admire, the Wisdom which perceived the Necessity of that Dismissal, or the Firmness which directed it.

We feel most sensibly that this Act, among many others in your Majesty's auspicious Reign, manifests your Majesty's high Regard for the Constitution of these Kingdoms both in Church and State; and we fervently pray that Providence may long continue to us your Majesty as its watchful Guardian.

In Testimony whereof we have caused the Common Seal of the said City to be hereunto affixed, this 11th Day of May, in the Forty-seventh Year of your Majesty's Reign.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, in Common-Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, beg Leave to approach your Throne with Sentiments of the liveliest Gratitude and Affection for your firm and uniform Maintenance of the Constitution in Church and State.

Whilst we view in our beloved King the pure and amiable Virtues which embellish private Life, we can also trace with peculiar Delight the Magnanimity, Wisdom, and Piety which dignify a public Character, and add Splendour and Renown to the most illustrious and upright of Sovereigns.

Your loyal Citizens of Dublin have also perceived with heartfelt Satisfaction that no undue Regard to the Opinions of any Men could ever induce your Majesty to violate the Rights of Conscience, or the Principles of that glorious and matchless Constitution, which your Majesty's protecting Virtue will support and maintain in its original Purity, and transmit to your Posterity undiminished and unimpaired.

And we trust that your Majesty's loyal Subjects of every Description, sensible of the Blessings which they enjoy under a Constitution which equally protects their Lives, their Liberties, and their Properties, will feel that enthusiastic Veneration for it which its Merit justly inspires, and will manifest their ardent Love to your Majesty, who, consulting the Happiness and Welfare of your People, wisely determined to maintain it inviolate in all its Parts, well convinced that the Infringement of any might endanger the Safety of the Whole. That your Majesty may long live to enjoy the Affections of your loving and beloved Subjects, is the ardent Prayer of your faithful Citizens of Dublin.
