The humble Address of the Burgesses, Incorporations, and Inhabitants of the ancient Burgh of Inverkeithing.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects, beg Leave to approach the Throne, deeply impressed with Sentiments of Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, and Gratitude for the many and invaluable Privileges and Blessings derived from that Constitution under which we live.

We greatly admire and applaud that Resolution and Steadiness displayed by your Majesty on a late important Occasion, when Circumstances required the Exercise of the Royal Prerogative to preserve and maintain the civil Constitution, as by Law established, and the Protestant Religion, secured to us by the strongest Obligations and most solemn Engagements.

We embrace the present Opportunity to declare, that your Majesty may always rely upon our cordial Support, and every Exertion in our Power, to defend that excellent Constitution in Church and State, which, under a Race of Protestant Kings, has so long secured to us the Enjoyment of our Religion and Liberty, and so eminently promoted the national Prosperity and Happiness.
