

tured home from *England*, and the Duke his Father is expected in a day or two. From *Liconia* we have Advice that the Gentry of that Country would not submit to the Decree lately made in the Assembly of the States at *Stockholm*, concerning the re-union of the alienated Crown-Lands, in which most of them are concerned; and that it was feared, in case the same were put into execution, it might occasion disturbances. It is reported that the King of *Denmark*, who is expected very suddenly in *Holstein*, will bring a great many Troops with him, he intending to form an Army of 12000 Men, which whether true or false does alarm this City, who cannot but be jealous of the least motion of that King this way.

*Brussels, March 28.* The Magistrates of this City have finally prevailed with the Commons to grant the Imposition of the 20th Penny, which the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* asked of them before he left this Governement; and now the Prince of *Parma* will make another Demand in his own Name. On Wednesday last we received Advice from *Luxemburg*, that 5 or 600 Peasants not being able to bear the Treatment they receive from the French, had got together, and had fallen upon three Troops of Horse and two Companies of Dragoons as they were dispersed in their Quarters in the night, and had killed about 50 of them; but that upon the Alarm, some other French Troops coming to their Assistance, the Boors retired into a neighboring Village, where some hundreds more have joyned them, being resolved to defend themselves in case they are attacked. This accident has brought more French Troops into that Country, upon which it is to be feared they will take their Revenge.

*Brussels, April 1.* The Prince of *Parma* was yesterday upon the point of leaving this City, and the Courts and Councils were also to remove within two or three days: but upon the Instances that were made by the Magistrates, and some of the chief of the Commons, his Highness delayed his departure for some days, to see what success the second Demand he has made of a Supply for the maintenance of 2500 Men that are to be kept in Garrison here will have. On Sunday last arrived here an Express from *Paris*, with Letters from the Spanish Minister there, who as we are informed, acquaints his Highness, that upon the Representations he had made, concerning the Count de *Bissy's* Proceedings in the Province of *Luxemburg*, he had received this Answer: That the King would maintain the Peace, but that he would have what belonged to him; and that he would Quarter his Troops upon the Country till he was possessed of such Places, which as Dependencies he had a Right to. This Day the Count de *Taxis* was Declared Prince de la *Tour*. Tomorrow the Count d' *Archin* to go for *Antwerp*. On Saturday arrived here the Earl of *Castelhaven*.

*Brussels, April 4.* The Nations of this City are still Assembled, but seem not inclined to grant the Supply demanded by his Highness, who has therefore Commanded the Councils and Sovereign Courts to remove from hence before the 9th Instant, and to settle themselves at *Malines*, *Louvain*, and *Vilvoord*, which occasions much trouble among the People, who are sensible how much they shall

suffer thereby, and had hoped that his Highness would have been prevailed with to change his Resolution of leaving this place. The French Troops continue in the Country of *Luxemburg*, and live upon the Country-people, and Declare they have Orders so to do, till *Virton* and *Arlon* be put into their hands. From *Lille* they write, that they are going to pull down part of the Walls of *Tournay*, in order to the enlarging the City, and till they be made up again, that a Body of Men will be posted at *Pont Esperies*, and that to that end several Troops of the Kings Household are already come to *Lille* and *Spres*.

*Marseilles, April 1.* Three or four Algerines have been cruising since the beginning of the last Month on these Coasts, but all the mischief they have done, has been the taking of two or three small Barks belonging to *Genova*. Here are in Port three or four English Vessels bound for *Italy*, who dare not venture to Sea till the Coast is clear. We are told that the King is sending a second Envoye to *Algiers*, to endeavour to establish the Peace; in order whereunto, his Majesty has caused all the Algerines that were Slaves in his Gallies to be released.

*Paris, April 5.* We are expecting the arrival of the Moscowite Ambassadors in this City, who landed at *Calais* the last week, whither they came by Sea from *Holland*: We are told that they are sent by the Czar to our King, to propose an Alliance between them, and to make some Overtures concerning Trade. This Court is now in Mourning for the death of the Princess *Isabella*. There arrive very frequently Expresses from *Rome*, but we know not what they bring, farther than that in the general it is said, That the Cardinal d' *Estree* is not like to do any great good there, the Pope appearing resolved not to depart from the Rights of the Church.

*Deal, April 1.* This morning we espied upon the *Goodwin Sands* a Flyboat, upon which, several Boats went off to her assistance, they understood that she was bound from *Dunkirk* to *St. Maloes*; but some hours after she had the good fortune to get off again, and took her course to the Southwards.
