OUBTS having arisen whether the Notification of the 11th of March 1807, of the Blockade at the Entrances of the Rivers Ems, Wefer, and Elbe, was intended to include, and did include, all Rivers, Ports, and Places on the Coast between the faid Rivers Elbe, Weser, and Ems, the Right Honourable George Canning, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has notified to the Ministers of Friendly and Neutral Powers, resident at this Court, that the said Blockade was intended to include all Rivers, Ports, and Places between the faid Rivers; and that it will be maintained and enforced with respect to the whole Coast from the Elbe to the Ems.

St. James's, June 17, 1807. THE following Addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkesbury, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty. WE, the Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, and Free-holders of the loyal County of Brecon, humbly approach your Majetly's Throne, for the Purpose of declaring our firm Resolution to Support the free Exertion of the Powers fo judiciously velted in your Person by the happy Constitution of this Country, convinced that the peculiar Blessings which we have enjoyed for a Period of near Fifty Years, have been fecured to us by the due Preservation of the just Prerogative of the Crown, no less than by that first Attention to the Subject's Liberty, which has invariably marked the equal Administration of your Majesty's Government; and fully satisfied that the same Firmness, which has hitherto exempted us from the Calamities now defolating the Continent of Europe, will preserve us still uninjured, and prevent the ill Effects of any Combination of Individuals whatever. Most Gracious Sovereign,

Permit us further most dutifully to affure your Majesty, that the Loyalty and Affection of your Subjects remain unaltered and unalterable, upon the fure Foundation of Veneration for your Person, and Gratitude for your Virtues, of Allegiance to your Crown, and Attachment to the Constitution.

And finally, that we are resolved to submit to every Sacrifice, and to contribute every Effort which

may enable your Majetty to bring to an honourable and fecure Termination, the great Contest in which we are engaged.
