Real Estates late of THOMAS WYER, deceased, situate at Goxhill and Imingham, Lincolnshire.

Whereas many Searches have been made in the Register-Books of the Parish of Goxhill, and of other Parishes in the Neighbourhood, and also among Copies thereof remaining in the Registry at Lincoln, and many other Inquiries made for the Purpose of ascertaining the Heir at Law entitled to the Real Estates late of Thomas Wyer, of Goxhill, in the County of Lincoln, Farmer, (who died in 1787, intestate, leaving Issue, who are all since deceased, in their Minority,) and whose Father, Thomas Wyer, the Purchaser, heretofore of Habrough, in the said County, Farmer, died in 1776, intestate, and which said Thomas Wyer, of Habrough, was born at Goxhill in 1703, and was one of the Children of Henry Wyer and Ellen his Wife, all whose Issue and their Descendants are now extinct. It is supposed, that the said Henry Wyer was Servant in Husbandry to Thomas Cavill, of Goxhill, who was the first Husband of the said Ellen, whose Maiden Name, it is supposed, was Richardson, and from the Issue of which Marriage there are Descendants now living. The said Thomas Cavill died in 1693; and in the Registry at Lincoln, is the following Copy:—"Wrawby, 1696, Henry Wyer and Ellen were married the 30th April," which Ellen was the Widow of the said Thomas Cavill, as appears from the Will of her Son, Thomas Cavill. The said Henry Wyer and Ellen his Wife resided at Goxhill, where their Children were baptized; the said Henry Wyer survived the said Ellen, and died at Goxhill 1732, but no Discovery has yet been made who were the Parents of the said Henry Wyer, or where he was born, or whether he had any Brother or Sister, from whom there is any Descendant now living, nor of any further Notice of the Ancestors of the said Thomas Wyer, of Habrough, ex parte paterna.

The Purport of this, therefore, is to give Notice, that unless any Person can produce a Specification of his or her Relationship to the Family of the said Thomas Wyer, of Habrough, ex parte paterna, so as to be entitled to claim the said Real Estates, the Descendant of a Brother of the said Ellen, who claims to be entitled thereto, as Heir at Law ex parte materna of the said Thomas Wyer, of Habrough, will proceed to recover Possession thereof.

Any Person who remembers the said Thomas Wyer, of Habrough, and has heard any Declarations from him respecting his Kindred, or who can give any other Information in the Matter, is requested forthwith to transmit the same to Messrs. Hefledon and Son, Solicitors, at Barton-upon-Humber.

Harvey, Bryant, and Maydwell, the Solicitors to the Assignees, having been directed by the Assignees, or one of them, in consequence of an Order from the Committee appointed to act in and manage the Affairs connected with the Bankrupts' Contract for the Purchase of the Fisherwick Estate, to retain and keep in their Custody and Possession such Deed so executed by the said Assignees, and not to exchange the same for that executed by Lord Chichester and his Trustees, as aforesaid; and Messrs. Harvey, Bryant, and Maydwell, having been called upon by the Solicitor of Lord Chichester and his Trustees to make such Exchange; the Creditors of the Bank-

rupts are desired to meet the Assignees and the Committee at Batson's Coffee-House, Cornhill, in the City of London, on Friday the 28th Day of August instant, at Twelve of the Clock at Noon, to resolve, determine, and direct whether the said Agreement executed by the said Assignees shall be exchanged for the other Part of the said Agreement, or shall be retained; and on other special Affairs relating to the said Agreement.
